

WATER SUPPLY IN SCIO WELL IS ADEQUATE

Scio—Thorough test of the supply of water in the city's 205-foot well was recommended by R. J. Strasser, Portland driller who sank the well here in 1931. Strasser inspected the situation here this week in response to a request of the city council through the proper committee.

Strasser is of the opinion that an adequate supply of water is available in the well, as he stated at the time he completed drilling. However, it is best to be certain in the premises, he warned, before making arrangements for a pump of greater capacity, as has been considered by the council as a result of water shortage in the city during the recent past.

Some of the council members contend that lack of water is due to waste rather than to inadequate supply. Wooden mains have been serving the city for many years and in many instances these antiquated pipes have outlived their usefulness and become considerably deteriorated, they declare. Leaks of considerable magnitude are said to have resulted.

Expenditure of several thousand dollars would be necessary to replace these mains with metal conduits. Financing of this feature could be handled through a bond issue, which might also cover the expense of a new pump in the event the latter should become a necessity.

Glacial water might appear later in the season, as it has in the past, in the opinion of Strasser, thus eliminating necessity for drastic action at this time.
