

COUNTY SCHOOL COSTS VARIED SILKE REPORTS

Hubbard—The annual school election held at the schoolhouse Monday evening resulted in the election of W. D. Brown as director for one year and the re-election of D. E. McArthur for one year; the former was opposed by Glen Larkins, the latter by A. F. de Lespinasse. The meeting was presided over by George Grimps, retiring board member who served one term of three years. Brown has served several non-consecutive terms. The other members of the board are Garfield Voigt who becomes chairman and Earl Looney. Forty-one votes were cast.

During the hour which the law requires between the time of election and the counting of the ballots, a report was given by Eugene Silke, former superintendent who will be with the union high school at Canby this coming school year. He gave statistics on a ten year period for the high schools in Marion county. The list included Silverton, Astoria, Jefferson, Hubbard, Salem, Scotts Mills, Stayton, Turner and Woodburn.

In the high school group Hubbard was the fourth lowest in the tax rate for the ten year average. These figures were compiled from the records of the county superintendent's office and that of the assessor. Hubbard's average tax for that period was 15.27; Silverton ranked highest with 21.21. The lowest was Jefferson with 10.57.

Voigt spoke of the school visits the board had made during the year, stating that many high and grade schools were visited during the year and that the Hubbard school, buildings and general equipment ranked with the best of these schools. During the evening it was brought out that the indebtedness of the district was \$1000 in bonds and \$4200 on the gymnasium. The latter was paying for itself by tuition of out of district students.

SCHOOL BOARDS DISTRICT VOTE ARE COMPLETED

Independence—A large attendance of patrons of the school district were present at the school meeting. W. T. Hoffman, chairman of the school board called the meeting to order and the clerk gave the yearly report. Hoffman was re-nominated to succeed himself as director, by J. F. Swope, and C. G. Irvine was nominated for clerk to succeed himself. There were no other nominations. Other members of the board are J. E. Kelley and E. A. Dunckel.

The matter of introducing music into the high school course was brought before the meeting by Valen Guild, a local musician with a proposal to make it a part time subject in addition to regular high school course of study. That would necessitate adding a part time teacher to the present staff. After some discussion on the matter something was said about the necessity of a new high school, which resulted in the two issues becoming confused and neither project was put over.

ALBANY VOTERS TO BALLOT FOR NEW BUILDINGS

Albany, Or.—Members of the Albany school board are to call an election, it was voted Monday, at which time voters will be asked to approve a proposed \$160,000 bond issue to finance renovation of the Albany high school building and for the erection of two new grade school buildings. The election is scheduled to be held within the next 30 days.

The plan calls for expenditure of \$61,000 in remodeling the Albany high school building, \$45,000 for the erection of a 10 room building to replace the frame portion of the Madison school and \$50,000 for replacement of the Maple school with a 6-room building.

The high school plans include erection of two wings, of which one will be a gymnasium and the other an auditorium.

Both of the new school buildings, at Madison and Maple, will be of one-story construction.
