

VOTE REVEALS NEW DIRECTOR MANY BOARDS

Hayesville—Will Powers was elected clerk of Hayesville school district for a period of one year. H. J. Smith, clerk for the past two years, was not a candidate for re-election.

Charles Andresen was re-elected to membership on the board for a three year term. This will be his third term. Other members of the board are Dr. Fred Ellis, chairman, and H. Robertson.

The clerk's annual report showed the district to be in excellent condition financially. The budget for the year has not been worked out as yet by the board members due to matters pertaining to the additional room which will be built to the school house this summer.

He said further that the Townsend plan would eliminate 60 per cent of crime, the plan will prevent crime by clearing slums, doing away with idleness and ending poverty. Arbuckle also told his listeners that "the Townsend organization is not a political group nor does it ever intend to be, but we intend to have a lot to say about politics, as well as economic and social phases of this country."
