

SUMMER WORK AT MT. ANGEL IS UNDER WAY

MT. ANGEL—The summer school session at Mt. Angel college and Mt. Angel Normal school opened Tuesday morning with a high mass and will be open until August 2.

From every indication the enrollment will be as large, if not larger, than that of last year. So far six Benedictine sisters from Cottonwood, Idaho, have registered besides many teachers of the community and neighboring towns, who are also taking advantage of the summer session.

Students fulfilling the requirements may earn nine term hours of normal school or college credit. Three-hour courses in the following subjects are being offered: teaching of religion in the lower grades, college German, tests and measurements, introduction to education, nineteenth century literature, children's literature, written English, economic geography, American history, biology, Latin III, child psychology, public school music and art. Other classes will be arranged by request of at least four applicants.

Since both Mt. Angel college and Mt. Angel Normal are institutions fully accredited by the state and the northwest association of secondary and high schools, college credit may be earned toward the bachelor of arts or science degrees.

Catholic Religion Head Will Be Celebrant Upon His Golden Jubilee Date

MT. ANGEL—The Mt. Angel Academy orchestra will go to Oregon City Thursday to play at the golden jubilee dinner of the Right Rev. Anthony Hillebrand. The programs will be in honor of the 50th anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood at Douvain, Belgium, June 28, 1885.

Many honors have been bestowed upon this famous religious leader, Catholics that come to but few of the Catholic clergy. He has been vicar-general of the archdiocese since 1919; in June, 1920, he was given the title of primate apostolic; Monsignor Hillebrand also holds the titles of dean, synodal examiner, official, censor librorum and member of the diocesan school board.

When the church leader was ordained the ceremony was by the Right Rev. Aegidius Junger, bishop of Missoula, Washington territory. The young priest asked to come with the bishop to the Pacific coast of North America, and permission was granted. Lacking only a few weeks, Monsignor Hillebrand has been in Oregon a half century.

Next Thursday's celebration will begin at 10 a. m. when Monsignor Hillebrand will celebrate mass in his parish church. Archbishop Howard and many of the leading clergy of the state will be present. During the 15 months interregnum from the death of Archbishop Monsignor Hillebrand held the important office of administrator for the archdiocese.

Thursday noon a dinner will be served at McLaughlin Institute by the ladies of the parish. That night a civic celebration will be held, which time it is expected that all the speakers will be Protestants.

Monsignor Hillebrand was born at Brilon, Westphalia, Germany, July 19, 1850. He first attended the University of Munster, later going to the American college at the University of Louvain. He has long been an active member of the Knights of Columbus.
