Song service was led by Claude Neely at 7:30 and the opening address on the subject of "Why the Church?" was delivered by the guest speaker, Rev. J. Warren Hastings of Seattle, Wash. Wednesday afternoon the convention opened at 9 o'clock with C. H. Hilton presiding. Conferences, educational and missionary were discussed, and at 10 o'clock Mrs. Goldie Ferguson of Springfield led the worship. Continuing to this year's convention theme, Rev. BURGLARY SUSPECT ONLY FALSE ALARM

Monmouth—Near by residents of the First National bank of Monmouth, aroused by the sounding of the bank's burglar alarm Tuesday night, were all set to witness the unwelcome spectacle of a bank robbery. The activities of the night watchman and an employee of the bank failed to find any trace of prowlers nor could they ascertain the cause of the sounding of the alarm, which continued uninterrupted for 10 minutes at 3 o'clock in the morning. It is said, once before the mechanical device mysteriously summoned help to the bank, this time in the early part of the evening.

DALLAS BANK BIDS FOR SCHOOL BONDS

Dallas—The City bank proved to be the successful bidder on the bonds for the new school building when the bids were opened at a special session of the school board this week. The bank's bid was \$40,000 at 3 1/2 per cent. Other bids submitted were by the state of Oregon at a straight 3 1/2 per cent; by Hees, Tripp and Butnath with 3 1/2 per cent on \$7,720 and 4 1/4 per cent on the balance and by R. L. Chapman, who tendered a bid on the first four bonds at 3 1/2 per cent.
