

HAMMAN'S BODY FOUND IN POOL NEAR MILL CITY

Mill City—The north fork of the Santiam river gave up the body of Joseph Hamman, pioneer stage operator between Salem and Mill City, shortly after 2 o'clock Thursday afternoon. It was found in an upspring pool into which he fell while fishing. His body had stopped at 11:34 o'clock. Contact was made with grapping hooks by Frank Bentley, road worker, who hastily constructed a raft.

With Hamman at the time was Parley Linn, 735 North 15th street, Salem, close friend and neighbor. She attempted a rescue and then hurried to the highway and sent Millard Bonker, county truck driver, for assistance. She was under a doctor's care last night, suffering from shock.

Hamman was 58 years old and was among the first to operate stages in the valley. He was born in Waterloo, Ind., and came to Oregon in 1860, locating at Stayton, where for six years he operated a transfer line and a horse-drawn stage between Stayton and West Stage. More than 20 years ago he started the Mill City line, replacing horses with motor stages in 1914.

He is survived by five children, Floyd and Gilbert, Hamman, and Mrs. Harold Deason of Salem, Gladys Hamman and Mrs. Hazel Schaefer of Portland; two brothers, Ed and Frank Hamman of Salem, and one sister, Mrs. Grace Mason who lived with him. Funeral arrangements are in charge of the Clough-Barrick mortuary.

BANK DEPOSITS ARE RELEASED

Stayton—Announcement that ten per cent dividends in both the commercial and savings departments of the Bank of Stayton are ready for distribution and will be mailed out Friday, July 5 to the depositors entitled to these dividends was made this week by Ray H. Mills, liquidator representing the state banking department.

The dividends on the savings deposits brings payment in that department to 60 per cent of the total which was on deposit in May, 1932, when the bank closed and will amount to \$12,477.59. Mills stated. The dividend by the commercial deposits brings payment in that department up to 30 per cent of the total and will amount to \$21,350.43. Liquidation of the bank is proceeding. Dividends will be paid at a later date.
