

STATE ENDEAVOR CONVENTION IS NEARING CLOSE

NEW OFFICERS WOMEN'S WORK ARE SELECTED

Turner—The state convention of Churches of Christ in session at the Tabernacle this week, is drawing large crowds with most registering daily. Friday night it was estimated 500 persons registering and on the grounds. The closing day of the convention a record attendance of more than a thousand is hoped for.

He has been vicar-general of the archdiocese since 1919; in June, 1920, he was given the title of protonotary apostolic; he also holds the titles of dean, synodal examiner, official, censor librorum, and member of the diocesan school board.

LINN DEFENDS BOND ACTIONS

Albany, Or. — Linn county's defense against the federal court injunction prohibiting it from selling \$20,000 Klamath county road bonds, from appropriating approximately \$8000 remaining proceeds from sale of \$40,500 in bonds last year was rested by District Attorney J. K. Weatherford, Jr., and Mark Weatherford, representing the county, Thursday, at a federal court hearing conducted before David B. Evans, master in chancery.

During the course of the hearing the county introduced evidence concerning notes totaling approximately \$200,000 which were either unsecured or which it was contended were secured by more than three-score slanders.

It was testified C. C. Bryant, receiver of the First National bank, that the bank owed between \$100,000 and \$200,000 to the reconstruction finance corporation, and was questioned concerning the minutes of directors' meetings at which applications for these loans and loans from the U. S. National bank of Portland were authorized.

Independence Landmark Giving Way for Modern Building and Disappears

Independence—What was built originally in 1889 as the Congregational church and later served for a number of years as the G. A. R. hall and still more recently used as a combined dwelling and church house or Emanuel hall, so named by its purchaser, Rev. Frank Kalles, five years ago, is now being razed to give way to a more modern structure or dwelling.

The property was sold to D. B. Rush a few days ago, and he is doing the work of tearing down, and will use the material to build a home on the same lot. The building was odd in form, being an octagon in shape, built of frame construction with brick foundation. Rev. D. V. Poling was pastor during the time of its construction and dedication and only a few of the original members of the church remain in this vicinity.

The building is located at "B" street and the owner in wrecking the building is on the lookout for a corner stone or marker in the foundation. Old-timers recall that the Congregational church disbanded after ten years, many of the members joining the Methodist and Presbyterian churches of the city. The Evangelical church took over the property and used it for about 12 years when it was sold to the Grand Army of the Republic who used it until eight years ago. The ranks of the G. A. R. became so depleted that they decided the property to the Woman's Relief Corps, who in turn sold it to Rev. and Mrs. Frank Kalles five years ago. During the past winter it was used as a class room for the SERA students, and occupied as a dwelling by the Kalles family.

The wrecking of the building marks the end of another landmark in Independence.

Rush came here about five months ago from Corvallis where he has lived for two years. He came previously from California, being a contractor and carpenter, will do the most of the work himself on his new dwelling.

Rev. Kalles and family expect to locate in Idaho where he and his wife will do evangelistic work.

SHEEP KILLERS WAR DECLARED

Independence—War has been declared on sheep killing dogs by the farmers in the Parker district, their flocks having been ravaged during the past few days and many sheep and lambs slain.

It is becoming so alarming as the number of sheep killed increases at each attack. Farmers are laying out with their flocks at night and the last report comes from S. J. Hubbard, who lost six fine ewes on Thursday night and who had evidence that a shot was fired at two dogs at long range but was not successful in killing either. One was a small fox terrier and the other a large part white and yellow Cattle. They traveled east toward the river when fired at.

Other farmers in the community who lost sheep during the week were K. L. Williams, 21 head; Lester Cline 8 head of registered ewes; Ed Vieth, 7 head of fine ewes. These were killed outright and others are mangled and will probably die from infection. The sheep have been scattered over a wide area, some having been forced across the Luckimute river.

Chains for the dead animals will be filed with the county. The amount allowed by the county for these does not reimburse the farmer in full for his loss.

Sheep-killing dogs are known to travel great distances at night to do their killing, and stray dogs in any neighborhood should be reported to the proper authorities.
