ALBANY SCHOOL ELECTION SET

Albany—Voters of Albany school district No. 5 will go to the polls situated in the high school, Tuesday, July 9, to determine whether or not they wish to approve a proposed bond issue of \$100,000 to enable the district to take advantage of whatever benefits are offered under the federal relief program.

According to the interpretation placed upon the program by the board, only 55 percent of the \$100,000, or \$55,000, in indebtedness will be actually incurred by the district. Immediate action was deemed essential in order that local machinery for constructing the school improvement program might be ready to operate as soon as federal approval of the project is forthcoming.

The board's adopted improvement plan calls for replacement of the wooden portion of the Madison junior high school, remodeling of the senior high school and replacing of the Maple school, which is a wooden structure.
