

RIDDELL PLANS IRRIGATION AS RELIEF PROJECT

Menmouth — The Menmouth chamber of commerce which met in the Menmouth hotel Thursday night was slow in assembling but an important meeting for all that. The meeting was called to order by President C. F. Gillette with Oscar Groves acting as secretary.

As an amusement feature the Jayville orchestra of Salem was introduced by C. C. Powell who stressed their originality and talent. William Ridgell appeared before the members with a plea for aid in investigating Polk county irrigation as a relief project with government money. He suggested the two branches of the Luckiamute be impounded by the building of dams for flood control and summer irrigation. Both branches of the stream would lend themselves to this sort of treatment and experiments in the county especially for pasture and root crops have shown the advantage through irrigation. Irrigation water would also help in the city development.

By vote of the meeting the chamber president was authorized to appoint a committee to look into Mr. Ridgell's proposal.

C. C. Powell reported for the special fund which has operated good will auctions for the last year, showing considerable donations to customers through this means. The carnival, he said, had a balance of approximately \$100 to the good but the good will auction sale was in the red about \$200. This it was believed, came largely by expense costs in conducting sales. President Gillette was authorized to appoint a committee to develop a finance plan for the chamber.

A general discussion was indulged in relative to repeating the carnival and it was found sentiment among the line seems universally in favor of continuing it.
