Clans Gather At Sheridan; Many Attend

Sheridan—The eighth annual gathering of the DeSart-Armstrong clans was held Sunday in the Sheridan American Legion hall with over 100 present.

The DeSart and Armstrong families crossed the plains in an ex-cart train in 1864, coming from Illinois. George DeSart and his wife, Melissa Armstrong, came to the west with their two sons, Thomas and William. Theodore, Edgar and Traddus Armstrong, brothers of Melissa, also came at the same time as did Armstrong and his wife, grandparents of the DeSart boys and their sister, Lola, who was born in 1864 while crossing the plains, on the other side of Boise, Idaho, where the train stopped in Boise for the winter and came on in the spring, settling in Silverton. Here, George DeSart brought up this family of 13 children.

Mrs. Thomas Armstrong of Salem was the oldest member of the clan present Sunday. She was 81 in February. Carolyn Gene Morgan of Salem, two years old, daughter of Genevieve Morgan, was the youngest member present. Mrs. Turner of Raymond, Wash., and Ivan Murphy of Bend travelled the farthest to be present.

After dinner a program of music and speeches followed. A special feature was the pictures of Frank Bowser, cartoonist of Waldo Hills, a friend of Homer Davenport. Another special number was the singing by Echo Bowen, Maude Pooler, Bessie Turner of Raymond, Wash., accompanied on the violin by Earl Pooler, whose violin has been owned by William DeSart, oldest living son of George DeSart, since 1876, and a noted violin since it bears the date 1710, Antonius Stradivarius, and is one of the five famous violins by Stradivarius.

ARMY FLIERS WILL GATHER ALBANY PORT

Albany—Albany's municipal airport will be the scene of the annual summer encampment of the Oregon Army Air Corps Reserve officers of the 321st observation squadron, with Captain Paul E. Burrows, commander of Pearson field, Vancouver, Wash., in command, with Captain "Chuck" Gardner, Seattle, as assistant commander. The encampment will open July 9 and continue until August 1, Capt. Burrows announces.

When the 321st squadron moves out on July 18, the 45th bombardment squadron from the state of Washington will move in on July 23, and the maneuvering will be conducted out of the Albany airport until August 1.
