

RUBLE FAMILY RECEIVE BOOK WITH HISTORY

Lincoln, Ore., July 3.—"Westward Ho!" a 64 page book, compilation of the history of the Ruble family, was introduced to the members of the clan at the 14th annual Ruble reunion which was held at the Episcopal church on Chesapeake street in Salem. The book has been in process of being assembled for some time with Clara Zoe Froh to Corvallis, Mollie Clark Lilly, Corvallis, David R. Ruble of Lincoln, and Russell Rose of Lebanon collaborating in the work, and the first copies were taken from the press last Saturday.

Nine photographs of family ancestors were used in the book which is printed on beautiful paper, and near the front is a plate showing a diagram of the "T" Ruble. Walter Wheel, No. 1307, patented August 29, 1839, by Thomas Ruble of St. Mary's township, Adams county, Indiana, this being "an improvement in the mode of letting the water upon the water-wheel." In the effort of finding material for compiling the book, the committee came into possession of the first census report of the United States published in 1790, and in this the Ruble family was found to be located in Pennsylvania and Virginia, the early Rubles having come to America from Yaxa, Germany, and were supposed to be of Holland extraction.

Frank Warfield of Portland played the violin with Mrs. Joseph Benner of Salem accompanying at the piano. The assembly sang American songs. Mrs. Mollie Lilly of Corvallis recited a colonial poem about olden times. Joe Benner of Salem gave a talk on old pioneers and praised their stamina and determination in establishing civilization here. The oldest member of the clan present was Mrs. Mary Tubb of Portland, more than 80 years of age. The youngest was the baby son of Russell Rose of Lebanon, about a year.

Queen Georgianna Rules Mt. Angel's Celebration; Program Attracts Crowd

Mt. Angel—The coronation of Queen Georgianna I. took place on the huge open-air pavilion Wednesday evening with Father Gabriel officiating. The services were witnessed by a large number of friends and visitors from neighboring cities.

Queen Georgianna and Knight Frank Hettwer led the grand march, followed by Princess Mary Louise LeDoux and Knight P. F. Schmitt, Princess Madeline Persen and Knight Dr. O. F. E. Schumacher, and Princess Beatrice Mary and Knight O. L. Wilburn, and then the Mt. Angel 30 page band in uniform, after which a dance was given with the Barony Klapp orchestra of Salem playing.

Thursday morning at 10 o'clock the parade began, one of the outstanding in many years, starting at the school house grounds and marching straight down to the old Mt. Angel hotel, south to LeDoux corner, north to Ammann corner, east to P. N. Smith corner, north to Safford residence, west to bank corner, then south on Main street to Schmaltz warehouse grounds, where the auto part of the parade disbanded.

Band and school children marched back to the band stand. The school children singing "America" and a speech by Frank McCulloch of Salem, utilities commissioner, who substituted for Governor Gabriel, then took place. Father Gabriel was master of ceremonies.

The judges of the parade floats were Mr. McCulloch of Salem, F. S. Huxtable of Portland, and Jack McKillop of St. Paul. The line of parade was led by Dr. Schumacher dressed as a cowboy, who acted as marshal, then Mayor J. E. Webb, also on horseback, wearing his American Legion uniform, the Mt. Angel band, Queen Georgianna, princesses and knights in the royal float, and the school children. Then followed floats of Woodburn fire department, Woodburn fire department ambulance, U. S. Branch Bank of Mt. Angel, Frank Amann, Father's pharmacy, Silverton fire department, The American Legion, followed by a small float representing Mt. Angel's baby post, then Mt. Angel fire department, Salem Beer two floats, Schultz Sisu company, Klingner and Balmann, Mobile Gas, Our Gang fire department, Mt. Angel News, Richmond gas, Mt. Angel-Woodburn Lumber company, Unger funeral, Mt. Angel Truck line, Blatz Beer for Al Wilde, Mt. Angel fire department, and plenty of cloths to amuse spectators.

Firecrackers Are Harmless Hill Flowers

Silverton—June D. Drake has an array of firecrackers for an over the Fourth show that will harm no one. Drake is a fancier of out-of-the-ordinary native mountain wild flowers.

Overlapping the rows of San Juan mountain hills on his farm at Drake's Crossing in the Silverton Hills where he calls seed the hill flowers to scatter in far away mountain places, are twenty plants, technically known as Brodiaea-Coccinea, and commonly designated as Firecracker flowers, native of the mountains in southern Oregon out of Medford.

The fact that the Firecracker plant took so long to appear this year, attests to its being one of the most spectacular of blossoms grown.

The bloom is multiple, the cultivated plant and less in the wild state, and is borne on a wire stem twenty to thirty inches in height of a rich dark red color. The bloom is of a cerise color, one to two inches in length, hanging droopingly from the top of the stem by a slender dark red pedicel. Turning back slightly at the lower end of the flower, are apple green sepals as lobes displaying tiny red ruffly petals centered by heavily pollinated lemon colored anthers and stamens.

No leaf is visible in the mature bloom but early in the growth stage a thin grass-like leaf shows near the base of the stem.

The plant flourishes in mountain canyons and on hillside.

Silverton—The condensed statement of the condition of Cochrane and McClaine bank at the close of business June 29, discloses total assets of \$318,389.96, and total deposits of \$457,183.76.

The above figures show an increase of deposits since the last call for statement on March 4, amounting to more than \$35,000.

The reorganized bank opened for business on July 1, 1934, and has therefore been in operation a little less than one year. During that time, there has been an increase in deposits of more than \$120,000.00.

The present statement shows cash on hand and due from banks of \$172,644.69, and United States government bonds, stocks and fully guaranteed, to the amount of \$123,276.97, making a total in these two items of almost \$300,000.
