CAMP CALLS WOMEN
Albany—Thirty-five women have registered for the coming AAA Homesteaders' vacation camp, to be held July 11-14 inclusive, at Perrywood forest camp above Sodusville, according to Bertha Brev, chairman of the camp advisory council. No work is to be required of the women during their four-day stay at the camp and no compulsory activities will be imposed, though entertainment, study and recreational facilities will be provided.

BERRY PICKERS NEEDED
Albany—Requests for berry pickers in the berry fields around Albany far exceed the supply of pickers, Ralph Coleman, federal re-employment supervisor, states. Calls for 38 pickers were unfilled Friday, he said. Raspberries are the main crop just now being picked.

GRAIN TESTING DISPLAY DRAWS SMALL TURNOUT

Monmouth—Only a few farmers turned out to witness the demonstration of grain classification in Odd Fellows hall recently held under the auspices of the grain.

Eight representatives of the state and federal divisions of grain inspection were present and they brought an array of complicated equipment with them. They had a small mill for cleaning weedseed from grain; an electrical device for ascertaining the moisture of grain; a device for ascertaining weight and instruments for indicating percentages of food seed or waste in grain samples.

The moisture tester was used after the kernel of the grain had been broken. When this was put in the machine, within 20 seconds the dial indicated moisture percentage. This machine is similar to one used in determining the moisture content of lumber. Weight was determined by filling a brass bucket, leveled off with a rounded wooden strip. Division was obtained by pouring over a brass cone, the quantity being halved each time.

Testing for weed and other foul seeds or refuse was done by hand, picked out with tweezers after the samples had been reduced, giving a proportion of the whole. The foul material has to be one percent or more to be counted.

Different grades of mailing barley were exhibited. Also a tubular device for taking samples from a cue of grain. This enables them to take samples from every section of the cue and from the different depths from top to bottom. Attempts to deceive by placing wet or mouldy or any off-grade grain are thus promptly uncovered.

G. W. Wright of the state grain inspection division was in charge and led in explaining grading operations.
