

KLINGER FACES JUSTICE COURT ATTACK CHARGE

Silverton—Ernest Klinger of Mt. Angel was brought to Justice Court by S. A. Paine, constable of the Silverton district, late Saturday afternoon, on an assault and battery charge.

Klinger was said to have attacked Mrs. Joe Wills, a woman of more than 60 years of age, with a chain with which Mrs. Wills had staked the family cow. It was also reported that he beat her with a two-by-four after the injured woman had succeeded in getting the chain away from him.

Joe Wills, husband of the woman works in the mill of the Silver Falls Timber company here, and was called home about noon as his wife was feared to be in a serious condition. Two daughters of Mrs. Wills, Mrs. Lawrence Lammers and Mrs. Dave Allen, both of Silverton, were also called to the Mt. Angel home and stated that their mother did not recognize the members of her family.

Alfred placed Klinger's bail at \$200 which was promptly paid. He is to appear for an arraignment Tuesday afternoon at 4 o'clock.

NEW ORDINANCE READINGS HELD BY COUNCILMEN

Monmouth—At the last meeting of the common council the recorder was instructed to notify the Monmouth Lumber and Fuel company to vacate premises on which the company has no lease and remove the buildings. This is property formerly possessed by the railroad company through franchise and allowed the lumber company as a convenience and a matter of business. The buildings consist of sheds in which mill-end wood, etc., was unloaded and stored.

City Marshal Verd Shunk was allowed a vacation of two weeks and in the interval the deputy marshal, Fred Lofting will hold down the job.

An ordinance was introduced providing for the widening of Main street between Warren and Knox streets by the removal on the north side of the extra sidewalk width and curb, put in at the time Main street was paved in 1917. A similar space was taken from the south side but it is not contemplated to remove this. The distance covered is only one block. It is also proposed to round out corners by Morlan's store and by the bank, in the interest of easier passage on the highway.

Another ordinance was introduced which would define nuisances and prescribe methods of abatement. Although all nuisances are proposed to be covered, special instances are cited such as spitting on the sidewalks or on the floor or walls of public buildings. Also the accumulation of water so far as to breed mosquitoes, unsanitary privies where property abuts sewer, deposits or accumulations of rubbish or manure not protected from flies, weeds that harbor mosquitoes, etc. Penalties range from \$5 to \$50 with a continuance of constituting a separate offense each day.

A third ordinance make changes in fees for pinball and slot machines and provides the recorder issue a sticker for each machine licensed, giving dates when license is operative. This ordinance would amend ordinance No. 321, previously adopted. The council adjourned at the call of the mayor.
