

HOP FORECAST ANNOUNCED FOR PRESENT YEAR

United States hop production forecast at 49,406,000 pounds this year based on a condition of 81 per cent of normal and compares with 41,195,000 pounds last year and the five year (1928-32) average of 28,011,000 pounds, in a current bulletin from the department of agriculture.

The Oregon crop, forecast at 28,011,000 pounds, in a current bulletin is based on a condition of 74 per cent of normal.
