

RIVER CLAIMS FIRST VICTIM OF THIS YEAR

Independence—The Willamette river claimed its first victim of the season at Independence Tuesday when Harold Tillberg was drowned while swimming at the old swimming hole at Island field near Hill's pasture.

Harold, age 16 years, and a crippled boy, was the son of Mr. and Mrs. George Tillberg of this city. He was swimming with other boys and had attempted to swim across a channel in company with Billy Campbell about his age when he suddenly gave out and called for assistance. Campbell tried to help him to safety but soon gave out himself and with the assistance of others reached a place of safety.

The young women, Misses Dorothy Ray and Loretta Baker heard the cries for help and rushed to town for someone to go to their assistance. He went down in deep water and after several hours of efforts on the part of good swimmers and divers the body was located beneath some snags a few rods down stream near the piling that had been driven there two years ago as a break-water.

The body had been in the water since 11:30 o'clock a. m. and the water was so swift at that point that ropes were stretched across the channel, a boat anchored fast before anyone could be let down to get the body.

Senator Dean Walker made the dive which located the body but he was unable to bring it to the surface as it was held fast by the snags. The river bank was lined with citizens for several hours trying to give such assistance as could be offered. The boy's mother, frantic with grief over the fate of her son was being cared for by neighbors and friends.

The fire department was called out to assist in bringing the body to the surface. Volunteer help from Salem, Dallas and Monmouth arrived at the scene before the body was raised. It has been the custom for several years for school children and teachers to frequent this spot as it has not been considered dangerous. It was thought that owing to the boy's physical condition due to an automobile accident two years ago that he became exhausted from the long swim across the channel. He was in the hospital for several months when injured before, a broken pelvis and other injury to lower limbs which somewhat hampered his stroke.

When located the body was in about ten feet of water, very swift at that point just above the Independence Sand & Gravel plant.

At 3:05 o'clock the body was finally rescued from the water by Paul Robinson, principal of the Independence schools.

State officers were at the scene and directed the diving and took care of the crowds of people who thronged the banks. Deputy Coroner Harry Keeney took charge of the body and removed it to the chapel.

Bronze Tablet Dedicated For Pioneer Group

Monmouth—An interesting event to occur here Sunday was the unveiling of a bronze tablet and formal dedication ceremony by the Davidson-Murphy clan.

Approximately 70 descendants and their families of Rev. John E. Murphy were present for the annual observance and reunion held under the large trees on the Normal school campus.

The tablet, commemorating the service of Rev. John E. Murphy, first pastor of the early Christian church which occupied the site on which now stands the Normal school dormitory, was placed at the base of the large urn which holds prominent space in front of Jessica Todd hall. On the tablet is inscribed the following:

"In Memory Rev. John E. Murphy, 1806-1876, Pioneer Educator and Minister. Co-founder of the Christian college and first minister of the First Christian church of Monmouth which was erected on this site. This tablet erected and dedicated by his descendants July 14, 1935."

His grandson, Lawrence Wells, member of the First Christian church, Vancouver, Wash., gave the main address Sunday. Goldie Wells, granddaughter of the noted pioneer and for many years a missionary in the Congo country of Africa addressed the 75th anniversary of its founding and home-coming of the Monmouth Christian church last year on which day the Murphy clan met here for its reunion and attended the services. Next year's observance will also be held in this city. Rev. John E. Murphy was one of the five men who in 1854 located adjoining claims and donated the mile square of land which now comprises the present limits of the city of Monmouth.

FINANCES GOOD

Albany—Linn county's financial condition remains in excellent condition, it was shown in the semi-annual reports submitted Tuesday. With the heaviest expenditures already made, the county remains without any obligations. It cannot meet in cash, the report reveals. The county has spent \$309,901.17 and has \$276,232 cash on hand to aid in carrying on its operations during the remainder of the year, according to the report of the county treasurer. The report shows that the county received \$605,504 and had \$201,949.04 cash on hand from 1934. Transfers totaled \$846,087, balancing each other.

PAYMENTS AUTHORIZED

Albany—Payment of \$15,447.70 due to high school districts for education of children who are residents of Linn county non-union high school district, was authorized Monday by the non-union high school board which met at the courthouse. The allowance brings the total for the year to \$27,741.70. The board had previously allowed claims totaling \$13,940. High school pupils for whom claims were allowed totaled 346. Presuming that all of these children attended for the full year, the average cost per pupil was \$68.70. Lebanon's claim was the largest allowed, for the full year being \$14,257.22 for educating 210 high school pupils. Albany's claim of \$12,493.11 was the next largest.
