

SILVERTON SEEKS FUNDS FOR FEDERAL BUILDING

FORUM BOARD MEMBERS ARE TO TALK AIMS

How to obtain funds for the erection of a new federal building to cost around \$50,000 will be discussed in Silvertown tonight at a special meeting of the executive committee of the chamber of commerce.

Governor Charles H. Martin's office stated that it had been in touch with Silvertown men and also the government relative to a new post-office but as far as known here there are no funds available for this purpose. However, it is known that the needs of various communities relative to the erection of federal buildings.

Salem has been working on a similar proposition for some time with good prospects to obtain a building costing around a quarter of a million dollars to replace the structure which is not adapted nor large enough, even with the addition of a few years ago, to meet the requirements of the city.

Prominently identified with the movement looking towards a Silvertown post building are George Clutter, W. S. Jack and John Wilson, members of the Marion county democratic committee.

NEW ADDITION AT HAYESVILLE FOR FALL TERM

Hayesville—The contract for the erection of an additional room to the Hayesville schoolhouse was awarded to E. E. Batterman of Salem at a meeting held by the board of directors last evening. The bid offered by Batterman was the lowest out of the seven contractors offering their services.

Work will commence immediately as the contract calls for the completion of the room on or before September 10. The structure will be of the same nature as the rest of the school which is hollow tile, stucco covered and will be built on the southwest corner of the present school.

The primary grades will occupy the new room, intermediate and the upper grades in the same room as before when the fall term commences.

ARMY AIR BASE PLANS OUTLINED

Albany—Oregon has almost within its grasp a gigantic U. S. army air base, with Albany as a favored possible location. Dr. Raymond Staub of Portland, regional director of the American Frontier Air Defense league and member of the state aeronautical board, told an audience of local business men at the Veterans' Memorial hall Tuesday evening. The occasion was a dinner honoring the 13 reserve officers comprising the 321st observation squadron, now maneuvering with the Albany airport as their base, under command of Captain Paul E. Burrows.

Establishment of the base, however, Staub reminded his audience, is contingent upon passage of the Wilcox bill now on the senate calendar after nearly unanimous approval in the house, but likely to fail of passage before adjournment if not forced through the senate within a few days. Dr. Staub urged an avalanche of letters and telegrams to the Oregon delegation in congress demanding their every effort to speed passage of the bill.

The speaker discussed the progress of aviation and emphasized the defenseless condition of the Pacific coast before an attacking air force, which through modern developments may be launched from mobile bases. He denied that he is a "jingalot" but deplored a growing tendency toward non-resistance and anti-patriotism, especially in schools of higher learning.
