

NORMAL SCHOOL LETS CONTRACT FIELD OF SEVEN

Monmouth—The second advertising for bids for the new Normal school health and physical education building resulted in the receiving of a bid low enough to come within the limit of money available, and the bid was accepted and a contract let.

William and L. L. Quigley, Portland builders were the successful contractors, their figures being \$59,900. President J. A. Churchill announced at the meeting of the Luncheon club Tuesday noon that work would probably start in two weeks.

The PWA engineer in charge of this sort of thing informed him the project does not need further attention from Washington, D. C., and the matter is now up to the contractors.

Seven contractors submitted bids, the highest being \$74,380. Second lowest was the Perrellis construction company of Portland with \$62,289. The building committee had announced \$60,000 available and the Quigleys were the only contractors coming within the money limit.

President Churchill says the alterations in the plans to get a lower priced construction really is an improvement over the old plan. Some small rooms which were originally planned for the first floor will now be assigned to the basement which will make more room on the first floor. There has been nothing to interfere with the two handball courts planned for with F. E. R. A. aid.

LOOKS AFTER CASH

Albany—C. L. FIRE SWEEPS FARM

Albany—Damage of nearly \$500 was caused Thursday by flames that swept over 20 acres of the Charles Place farm near Tangent. The fire started from an unknown cause where a vetch seed thresher had been operating during the morning, and destroyed vetch that had been shocked on ten acres, ready for threshing. The remaining ten acres were stubble. Thirty neighbors organized to check the blaze, under State Officer Walter Winters, who happened to be passing. A rye-grass stubble field, a kind that is not highly inflammable, stopped the fire just before it reached a stack of sacked vetch seed containing several tons and the thresher, which had been moved.

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POLK STUDENTS ATTEND SCHOOL AT GOOD RATE

Dallas—The school statistical report, compiled from the annual reports of the teachers and the school clerks, for the year 1934-35 has been completed for submission to the office of C. A. Howard, state school superintendent.

The yearly census of boys and girls between the ages of 4 and 20 years showed that there were 2,611 boys and 2,599 girls or a total of 5,210 of both sexes in the county. Of this number 3,023 were enrolled in the grade schools and 873 in the high schools.

The total days attendance piled up by the pupils hit the half million mark with a total of 530,141. The days lost through absence were 21,896.5. The average daily attendance in the 71 districts totalled 3110.8 or 94 per cent. Tardy marks were chalked up against 2,597 students during the year while 302 pupils registered perfect scores by being neither absent or tardy.

The receipts from all sources, according to the district amounted to \$319,630.18, while the expenditures, including salaries, the expense to new buildings and other items came to \$281,087.37.

Bonded indebtedness in the county dropped from \$117,550, last year's figure to \$102,500, while warrant indebtedness showed an even greater decrease, pitching down from \$67,464.23 to \$35,227.63. These are only 12 district at the present time with outstanding warrants.

The total valuation of school properties, buildings, grounds, furniture, equipment is \$632,610.
