VERDICT GOES SKEEN FAVOR

Independence—A motion to set aside the verdict of the circuit court, which awarded Frank Skeen of Monmouth, damages totaling \$5928, was entered in circuit court by Melvin S. Hoover, defendant.

In the Hoover motion it was claimed that he was a juvenile, 19 years of age and "did not appear in court by a general guardian or guardian ad litem," and that the "circuit court did not and does not have jurisdiction to enter a verdict against a minor."

An affidavit was also filed this week by Circuit Judge Alford G. Walker stating that the court reporter, Miss H. J. Stratzel, was ill and could not transcribe the instructions of the court. Judge Walker set August 10 as the date for motion for new trial.

It is believed that a retrial will be held, based upon Hoover's motion, entered by Hoover's attorney. Petitions were entered in Judge G. L. Hawkins' court, asking that S. J. named guardian. The Skeen litigation, outgrowth of an automobile accident, had \$109 in court costs at the conclusion of the first trial.
