

LOONEY, DOTY FAMILY HOLDS ANNUAL EVENT

Jefferson—The annual reunion of the descendants of William and Eliza Looney and of Nelson Looney Doty, pioneers of 1844 and 1846 was held at the W. E. Doty grove five miles north of Jefferson on Sunday. This grove is on the farm that is part of the donation land claim homesteaded by Doty's father, Nelson Ransome Doty in 1846. Doty came to Oregon in 1844 and took an active part in the Cayuse Indian war.

Mr. and Mrs. William Looney and five children left Springfield, Mo. in the spring of 1849. They crossed the plains to California, coming to Portland by boat and by ox team to the vicinity of Jefferson where they settled. Soon after coming to Oregon Looney was drowned in the Santiam and his widow married Nelson Ransome Doty, who was a shoemaker and saddler by trade. He had the first tannery in Marion county. Of the six children born to Mr. and Mrs. Doty only W. E. Doty of Jefferson survives.

A basket dinner was served on long tables under the trees during the noon hour and the time was spent visiting and with sports of various kinds. Owing to the absence of the president the business meeting was dispensed with.

DREDGE FINDS SHALLOW WATER

Albany—Joseph H. Jolley, Portland, was fined \$10 in justice court Monday, was sentenced to 30 days in the county jail, and suffered revocation of his operator's license when he pleaded guilty to a charge of driving while drunk.
