Hicks and Mauldings Will Meet Sunday in Silverton City Park

Silverton—The Hicks-Maulding tribe are listed for the annual reunion Sunday in the Silverton city park. This group of pioneers of the late 60's and early 70's are many in number.

Molly McLaughlin - Nichols, granddaughter of Henry McLaughlin, is in possession of a scrap of paper that indicates the trend of the early efforts made to establish schools in the farming communities and tells of the beginning of the well known McLaughlin district.

Henry McLaughlin, oldest son of Oliver P. McLaughlin, who came to Oregon in 1865 from Iowa, settling in the Grand Ronde district where he directed a sawmill industry until 1870 when he moved to the Silverton communities.

Henry McLaughlin's children were Oliver P., married Isabella Maulding; Narcissa Belle, married Andrew McCracken; and Andrew Culbertson; Sarah Ann, married a Mr. Sutton; Mary Catherine, married Opp Culbertson; Emma, not married; Ida, married George Elliott; Louisa, married James Brown; Phillip; Amanda and Margaret died in infancy.

Henry McLaughlin was born in Indiana in 1822 and was married to Mary Ann Taylor, born in 1823, in the year 1840, and made the Oregon trip by ox team in 1866 from Iowa. The family home along the Abiqua was 60 acres, purchased from the John Francis Warnock donation land claim, three acres of which McLaughlin gave for the school site of the McLaughlin district. McLaughlin died at the farm November 3, 1874, and his wife passed away March 9, 1907, at the same home.

The Oliver Laughlin and Isabella Maulding children are Charles Ambrose who married Mathilda Forester; Benjamin Franklin, married Ida Finley and Prudence E. Shaw; Mary Belle (Molly), married Ralph Rice and Lester D. Nichols.

The Hicks group are related by the marriage of Catherine Ann Taylor, sister of Mrs. H. McLaughlin, and Frisby Hicks, pioneers of 1860. Their children were Philip, Pitt, Charles, Harry and Mary, who married John Maulding, bringing the Maulding name into the group as one division. The other Maulding groups were Kellan Tyler-Maulding, Isabelle McLaughlin's father, married Elizabeth Esely, who remained in the east and their children who came to Oregon included Kellan Tyler, Jr., Laban, John and Isabelle (McLaughlin). Remaining in the east with the parents were William, Charles, Milton, Elizabeth and Mary who married a Mr. Swan. Bent Maulding was a son by second marriage and came to Oregon. Bent's brothers remaining in the east were Marion and Schuyler, and a sister, Fernia.

Kellan Tyler Maulding, Jr. (Uncle Jimmy) married Martha Johnson and their children are C. A. Cora B. Matlock, Margaret M. Ivy, Jesse, John H., Clyde and Pearl Klunpp.

Laban married Sarah Kenworthy and their children were Nellie and Elizabeth Maulding, Rhoda and Sadie Burkhardt, Eugene and Milton. Two of the Frisby Hicks children married Morleys, Philip married Net Morley and John married Effie Morley.

Hundreds of the last two generations met for the annual reunion and a larger crowd than previously is planned for Sunday.
