

STEPS STARTED TO CLEAR SCIO WATER SYSTEM

Scio—The small pump and chlorinator to be readjusted preparatory to use while the larger pump in the city drilled well is removed to permit cleaning of the well, it was decided at the August meeting of the city council. Pipe in the 205-foot well will be cleaned and re-perforated in an effort to obtain a greater supply of water. The work will be done by R. J. Strasser of Portland, who drilled the well in 1931.

The council voted to have Mill street from Main street west to the city hall repaved to improve its surface. Grading of the street was disallowed as prohibitive in expense.

A draft for \$300.00 due September 1 is to be sent to New York bond holders. The amount is the last payment of interest on the city's indebtedness under the present rating. Bonds will henceforth be paid at the rate of \$1000 a year at 5 percent interest. The payment previously has been \$2000 annually at 6 percent.

At the request of W. T. Hornbeck, star route mail carrier, a "no parking" sign will be placed in front of the postoffice to facilitate unloading of mail.

Routine bills for light, power, labor and equipment were allowed. A payment of \$52.50 was voted to the Kroeman company for lumber to be used in building the sidewalk on the city property from the hall to the school grounds.

The meeting was in charge of W. A. Ewing, Scio mayor. All council members were present with the exception of N. I. Morrison and W. F. Bryan.
