

COUNCILMEN ACT ON MATTERS FOR ROUTINE EVENTS

Woodburn—The regular meeting of the Woodburn city council was held Tuesday night and business of minor importance transacted.

An offer was made by a Canby man for 600 feet of old wooden pipe taken from the mains which have recently been renewed but the council decided not to sell the pipe but to keep it for use in the city.

A statement was brought in by water superintendent Soules of the amount of water furnished the city by the Hay-Malling company while the city tank was being cleaned and repainted. No charge was made by the company for the large amount of water furnished over the period of a week for all city use and Recorder Beach was instructed to write a letter of thanks to the company.

George Royd of Salem was authorized to repair the city hall roof and his bill of \$225 was ordered paid. The work was ordered done at a previous called meeting which was held for another purpose, and has been completed, but the action taken was necessary in the order that it might appear on the records.

A letter was read from the state accident commission requesting the city to pay compensation on the firemen at a rate of \$20 per month salary for each man. This was left in the hands of City Attorney McCord for disposal.

Irvine Christensen made a request for water extension to his mother's property in the Hall addition near Harrison street and this was left to the water board.

Street Commissioner John Muir was ordered to spend a day cutting the dry grass and weeds on the parking area around town.

The meeting was not as uninteresting as the records show but a number of things which were warily discussed were not recorded. Bills for the month were examined and approved.
