ROAD PROJECTS FAVORED

Albany—Road and building projects whose total approximate cost is estimated at nearly \$300,000 were approved Thursday by the Linn county planning board. The largest of the projects was the \$100,000 Albany school building program, the list also included the prospective Halsey and Harrisburg school buildings, completion of 1.4 miles of new work to connect with a road in Lane county; building of seven miles of market road No. 2 between Harrisburg and Corvallis and renovation work at the county poor farm. All school projects are to be PWA and the road projects WPA enterprises. V. N. Stanbery, executive secretary of the state planning board, met with the Linn board.

HIGHWAY CREWS BUSY IN POLK

Dallas—Oiling operations, marking the beginning of the end on the Polk county road projects as part of the PWA road construction and improvement program carried on during the present year, were started Thursday by Babler Bros., working under the Theodore Arenz construction company.

The crew is now at work on the McNary-Oak Point road and will finish with the exception of the final stretch by Saturday night.

The crew will then move to the Salt Creek-Buell-Yamhill river section of the Coast highway where everything is in readiness for them. The final coat will be applied in about one month's time.
