

COIN SNATCHER BATTLE RAGING ACROSS RIVER

Dallas—First steps in the operation of slot machines in Polk county were taken last week by Sheriff T. B. Hooker and District Attorney Bruce Spaulding when letters were mailed to the owners and operators of business establishments within the county limits where such machines were set up with the warning that unless the machines were removed August 10 they would be removed and destroyed.

N. J. Arnold, owner of the machines, immediately filed an injunction to prevent such a happening and to enjoin Hooker and Spaulding from prosecuting any criminal action against the plaintiff and any of his lessees. A temporary order, signed by the county order was granted and a hearing set for Tuesday, August 20 at 10 a. m.

According to District Attorney Bruce Spaulding there are 22 such machines now in operation in the county, located at Independence, Monmouth, Hickrell, Valley Junction, Fort Hill Junction and Falls City. The plaintiff, N. J. Arnold, based his request for an injunction on the grounds that his machines of the approximate value of \$2,000 are games involving skill to the same degree as pitball and dart games. The operator recently made an offer to the city council of Dallas for a lease which was refused, despite the fact that the offer was an attractive one.
