

FLOOD CONTROL IS SUBJECT OF POLK PLANNERS

Dallas—The county planning board met in the county court room Monday night with Ira Powell, vice-chairman, presiding during the early part of the meeting during the temporary absence of F. D. Pomeroy, chairman. The meeting was exceptionally well attended and was opened with a discussion by Powell on flood control of the Little Luckiamute river. A delegation interested in such a project was on hand and the suggestion was offered by Carstetter, district engineer for the WPA that such a project should be presented to Major Cox of the U. S. Engineers and his aid enlisted.

West Salem, represented by Mayor Nugent and Colonel C. A. Robertson outlined proposed projects for that city including a new city hall, pumping station and waterworks.

Dallas, represented by Mayor Lelf Pineth and City Auditor Riley Craven, presented a project for a new city hall while a project for a new school in upper Salt Creek was also placed before the board. All three of these projects were approved by the members. A sanitary sewer for the city of West Salem also passed muster.

A project, calling for the development and improvement of the football field at Dallas was referred back to its sponsors for further information.

A list of possible projects was outlined by Fred Holman and were then turned over to the various subcommittees on the board for their consideration and report.

ORDINANCES TO MAKE CITY LOOK SPICK AND SPAN

Monmouth—Mayor F. R. Bowers has announced the following new ordinances passed recently by the city council:

An ordinance which has diminished the amount of bills and sales paper being left in the front yard on doorsteps. This has resulted in a betterment of streets and front yards.

Another is a license tax on certain types of games. The proceeds of this ordinance will be turned over to the support of the city library. It is thought about \$100 a year will be raised from this source.

An ordinance to prohibit any machine that will mow the surface of the newly oiled streets also has been passed. This carries a penalty of \$100 and the city intends to strictly enforce this ordinance. The city cannot afford to pave streets and then have them damaged by some thoughtless persons running over them with a harrow, disc, or tractor.

Prohibiting peddlers from annoying housewives by ringing doorbells and selling or soliciting sales is a late ordinance and should be welcomed by all the women in Monmouth.

A nuisance ordinance prohibiting the throwing of litter on the streets and covering many trivial annoyances is also in effect.

Citizens are asked to aid in the enforcement of these laws by reporting any infractions to the recorder, mayor or marshal.

SILVERTON FOLK GIVE ATTENTION TO REFINANCING
Silverton—A special meeting of the Silverton city council Monday evening postponed from last week resulted in many discussions and little definite business accomplished.

From the list of names submitted to the forum by the city treasurer, M. G. Gunderson, it was learned that more than 60 per cent of those eligible for the rebonding opportunity were named as having taken advantage of the applications whereby they would be relieved of the accrued interest up to May 1 of this year on unpaid street assessments.

This privilege demands that taxes must be paid on property and that interest is paid from May 1, 1935. The opportunity will be extended to others for a short time who wish to avail themselves of this plan.

Mayor E. W. Garver announced that SERRA privileges would continue to September 1 instead of the August 1 as previously determined.

The sum of \$70.55 was allowed for the purchasing of equipment for the playground and story telling classes under the park recreational plan. Tom Ballantyne and Celia Hamman are the supervisors of the summer work in activities at the park.

Applications of George Manolis and of Percy E. Byers for continuance of dispensing beer were approved.

Owners of property along Second street protested in a petition, the hauling of logs on the street as being detrimental to the pavement and the water main Re-routing was talked with the matter referred to the street committee.

A motion was passed authorizing the mayor to appoint a committee to enter into a contract with P. B. Sypher for making and placing street signs on various corners of town.

The proprietor of Breitenbush hot springs asked the council to see that the name of their resort was included among the other signs for direction out of town.

Plans were talked for enlarging and roughing the surface of several short turns on the principal traveled highways through town.

The question of further action concerning the building of a new library was tabled for the present.

Arthur Dahl, chief of police, submitted a list of sidewalks and trap doors in the city limits that needed attention with emphasis placed on the property on West Main street, near the Ford garage. This was left in the hands of the street committee with power to act. Chief Dahl also brought up the question of double parking on the business streets where the law permitted parking on both sides of the street in addition to double parking. The ordinance governing this was read and the members of the council left the

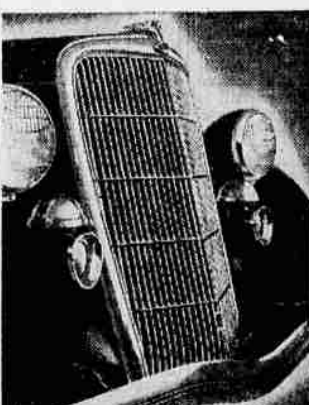
