## DUSTING POWDER BRINGING RESULTS

Dallas—The initial trial experiment of a new form of dusting powder for the control of the cucumber bug yielded excellent results on a number of plants on the E. J. Page place near the city.

The dusting powder, as yet unnamed, was prepared by the Aero Agricultural Dusters Corporation, was applied Wednesday night on plants which were literally infested with the beetle. Thursday afternoon the plants were clear of insects with a number of the bugs lying dead on the ground as evidence of the efficacy of the spray.

The powder is not harmful to humans or animals and can be used on arbor beans, squash and pumpkins with equal effect. Experiments are being conducted with the powder in other parts of the county.

## STATE COMBED BY ARMY GROUP FOR MORE MEN

Monmouth—An army recruiting party consisting of Second Lieutenant Raymond W. Sellers, 7th Infantry Sergeant Eldon E. Zinn, company K, 7th Infantry; Corporal I. D. Kubiak, company L, Seventy Infantry, and Private Albert L. Lauzenzo, service company 7th Infantry, was in Monmouth this week for the purpose of securing applicants for the U. S. army.

This party, one of two, is visiting all towns and cities in Oregon and Washington, spending at least half a day in each city.

The recruiting service is conducting an intensive campaign to fill the quotas laid down by the war department following the authorization by congress of an increase of 40,000 men in the army. Prior to July 1, the date the increase was authorized, young men had great difficulty in securing establishment because of the lack of vacancies, but now, according to Lieut. Sellers they have many branches of service and places of duty from which to choose.

That many young men have already taken advantage of the opportunity of earning while learning and traveling is shown, by the enlistment of 125 men in the Portland recruiting district during the month of July. According to Major H. D. Bagnall, district recruiting officer, this record is only exceeded by enlistments during the war.

Vacancies now exist in the Philippine Islands, with the coast artillery, on the Hawaiian Islands with the coast artillery, field artillery, infantry, engineers and chemical warfare service, in Alaska with the infantry, at Port Stevens, Oregon, with the coast artillery, medical corps and ordnance department at Vancouver barracks, Wash., with the infantry, medical corps and the quartermaster corps. Prior service men, discharged with excellent character ratings may secure duty in China.
