

# PROGRAM FOR VETS OF WARS PUT FORWARD

Silverton—In a concise and direct manner, Dwight E. Alderman, commander of Oregon Veterans of Foreign Wars, listed a definite program for the veterans to stand on at the annual picnic of the V.F.W., No. 3004, Sunday at the city park.

He briefly reviewed the history of the veterans organization as the oldest one of the recent wars. "The veterans favor the adjusted compensation," said Commander Alderman. He told of the uniform pension based on length and type of service; of a uniform system of pensions for widows, mothers and orphans; of their favoring the deportation of communists who advocate the overthrow of government; conscription of capital and industry as well as man-power; adequate national defense as recommended by the army and navy departments; and immediate payment of the adjusted compensation to the veterans.

An exceptionally large crowd was present which would probably have been much larger had not a few light rains during the early morning forecast bad weather. The Cherry City Bakery audition system was used for musical and program broadcasts.
