

NEIGHBORS AND CHILDREN GREET WOMAN AGED 94

Silverton—Silverton's outstanding citizens in point of years, health and general activities in the building up of the town of several years ago was singled out for a gala day Thursday, when her many neighbors gathered informally at her home on the occasion of her 94th birthday anniversary. She presided as the all-around hostess at her large home on West Hill that has been the scene of many of social meetings throughout the years.

This was Rebecca Stevens-Mount. Mrs. Mount recalls the trip across the plains in 1832 when she was eleven years of age and her reminiscences are equally as clear concerning events of the present more recent and up to the present accounts. She was made queen mother of the Stevens clan in their annual reunion earlier in the summer which has been observed as a custom for more than forty years.

Of her immediate family that were seated at the family dinner table at noon were the families of Dr. Guy and Dr. Albert Mount of Oregon City, Robert M. Ansel, Will of Woodburn, Minnie Hall and Clara of Chambersburg, and Eva of Wolford of Silverton, her children, and Dr. Frank Mount's family, her grandson of Portland.

Mrs. Mount is the mother of the late Wallace Mount, well known in legal circles of the Northwest, who was a graduate of the class of 1883 of the University of Oregon. She represents the sturdy and intellectual type of the pioneer mother.

Albany—Names of 13 men will be struck from the Linn county relief rolls unless they can show valid cause for failing to report to the national re-employment office today after being offered work on a local recreation camp at Clear Lake, Ralph Coleman, re-employment administrator, said today. Of 33 men notified to report for work on the project, only 10 appeared. Ten pleaded they could not leave home because of illness, care of cattle, and other duties, and 13 did not report at all.

BONDING ISSUE DISCUSSED BY CITY'S LEADERS

Silverton—City officials are desirous of making explanations concerning the bonding issue which cancels back interest up to May 1, 1935, on unpaid street assessments. Dissatisfaction has been voiced by property owners that had met the payment of interest on the assessments and had felt that discrimination had been indulged in.

The bond issue which was passed at a recent meeting of the city council merely enables those who have taken advantage of the re-bonding privileges to keep their property and saves the city from being over-loaded with more real estate than is feasible for them to handle.

The officials explained that should the city be forced to take over the homes, the city would not only have to pay back taxes but would lose future taxes. This process would raise the city taxes, they said, as no city has a fund to carry property and the cost of this can come only through taxes.

In answering the question that does the bonding issue throw the burden of the unpaid interest on those who have met their obligations, it is answered partly as true that it does, admit the officials, but the bonding issue, not carried, those who had would not only have the burden of back interest but of taxes as well. The city council chose, it was explained, the lesser of the two evils.

Mayor E. W. Garver stated that the city already has more property on its hands than it can dispose of. Would any of these persons, he asks, who feel the city should take more property be willing to take this property by way of purchase should the city become owner of it?

In conclusion, it was officially said that the new bonding issue which releases back interest up to May 1 of the present year but puts on a 6 per cent interest again, was passed according to an act of legislation and is entirely within the Oregon law.

INQUIRY MADE FOR NEWELL GRAVE SITE

Aurora—Six hundred four cars entered Champeer park during July and the count for August has already reached 382, according to the Champeer highway association. Inquiry has come from Walla Walla as to the burial place of the native wife of Dr. Robert Newell, whose wife died about 1845. Henry Zorn, who owns the Dr. Robert Newell D. L. C. believes he knows the location of the grave, which is on the bank of Champeer creek near where the original trail crosses the creek.

The other board members are John Stauffer and Roy Love. Sam Miller is clerk. The school is one mile north of Hubbard on the Pacific highway.
