

CITY MARSHAL FOR WOODBURN NOW OFF DUTY

Woodburn—Mayor S. A. Hofer abruptly terminated the services of John Muir, as day marshal at the meeting of the city council held Tuesday night. While Muir received no salary as marshal he had been sworn in and acted as marshal during the day time in addition to his duty as street commissioner.

By a vote of the council the appointive officers of the city were given a vacation of one week on pay. This includes the street commissioner, water superintendent and marshal.

A sidewalk was ordered built along the north side of Toust street which is a short street running from South Front street to Settlemier avenue, a distance of 400 feet.

Improvement of Yew street, between Second and Third streets in North Woodburn was discussed, the improvement being asked by Postmaster Butterfield in order that the mail delivery route could be extended. The type of improvement was not decided upon but the recorder was instructed to inform the postmaster that improvement of some kind would be made.

The street committee was instructed to investigate the condition of the sidewalk on Brown street and report at the next meeting whether the walk could be repaired or a new walk built.

An application for a recommendation for a beer license was read from George C. Foster who recently leased Ed's Inn on the Pacific highway and the application was given the approval of the council.

The recorder was instructed to notify the state accident commission the Woodburn fire chief is not a full time paid fireman and thus does not come under the state compensation act.

CANNERY HAS RUN

Seio—The county relief cannery had a heavy run in Seio Monday and Tuesday of this week, according to Don Telford, manager. The cannery is scheduled to return to Seio September 10, 20 and 21 for canning of tomatoes, Muir peaches and meats. Telford states that the cannery processed a total of 1861 during the two-day run in Seio. This is the largest record of any cannery in the county. String beans and corn topped the list of products.

HARVEST NEARLY OVER

North Howell—Harvest is over with some of the largest yields of fall sown grain for many years. Oats grown by Joe May averaged 108 bushels per acre and a six acre tract grown by George Willig near Mt. Angel averaged 119 bushels per acre. August Weiske had 14 acres of wheat that produced 55 bushels to the acre, an some smaller acreages going 65 bushels. Peach harvest is in full swing with all orchards reporting a small crop.

Silverton—The car belonging to Melvin D. Smith that was reported stolen from his home during last week has been recovered in Portland. The car is in good condition.

Scarcity of Pigs Noted by Farmers

Independence—There seems to be a scarcity of pigs in this section and farmers who are harvesting their crops just now are looking the country over for feeder pigs which range from \$5 to \$8 for weaned pigs six weeks old and older. The advance in price of pork has increased the demand for more hogs. Brood sows will be at a premium if the demand keeps up. The low price of grain will have a tendency toward the farmer feeding it to hogs.

LINN CLUB FAIR TO OPEN FRIDAY

Albany—Directors of the Linn county 4-H club fair were supervising a crew of men today in cleaning and repairing barns, pens, and booths at the county fairgrounds, preparatory to the annual 4-H fair, which opens for two days Friday at 8 a.m. Volume of inquiries concerning the fair leads O. E. Mikesell, emergency agricultural assistant, to predict that the number and quality of exhibits and the size of the attendance will make it the greatest fair of its kind ever conducted in Linn county.

Exhibits are to be in place by 10 a.m. Friday, when judging will start. A new feature of the fair will be the county-wide health contest, with Dr. G. E. Fortmiller of Albany as judge. Winners will compete in the state-wide contest in Salem at the state fair.

Beck, county agent, selected the goat clubs as fitting competitors to stimulate interest in goat raising.

Another new trophy to be offered this year for the first time is one by the county agent's office to the outstanding club member, either boy or girl, of the entire county. This latter trophy is to pass from one member to the other and does not become the permanent property of any club members.

The Dallas Kiwanis club is offering three silver cups, one each for the sheep, calf and cooking club projects. These go to the member enrolled in these projects that does the best work during the current year. At least four special silver trophies will be awarded to 4-H club members at the Polk county fair which holds forth August 28 and 29 in the Dallas arena.

Aside from these trophies are several cash awards offered by the fair board which have proven to be the points of greatest interest among the club members exhibiting at the county fair.

Albany—Coroner E. C. Fisher late Wednesday was still unable to identify an aged transient who was found dead under the north end of the Willamette river bridge in Benton county Tuesday.

The aged man had established a camp under the bridge a week ago and had been grinding axes and sharpening knives about Albany since then.

CONTESTS IN JUDGING WILL BRING AWARDS

Dallas—Judging and demonstration teams from all parts of the county will have their chance to win county championships Wednesday forenoon and Thursday morning of next week. The poultry, crops and home economics judging teams will have their contests Wednesday afternoon while the various demonstration teams will put on their shows Thursday forenoon at the county fair.

Nearly 100 club members are going to exhibit in the livestock and crops projects alone, according to cards that have been received asking for space in these divisions. According to K. W. Sawyer, assistant to the county agent's office, at least 14 different clubs will enter demonstration teams in the three contests for the agricultural clubs and probably as many in the judging contests.

In the livestock projects, demonstrations will be put on by the Rickreall calf club, Monmouth Junior and Senior sheep clubs and McTimmonds sheep club. In the crops division teams will be entered by the Oak Grove and McTimmonds corn clubs and the Falls City, Peedee and McTimmonds garden clubs.

A half dozen or more home economics clubs will compete in their contest and in the miscellaneous contest demonstrations will be put on by the Cochran and Brush college poultry clubs and the Buell forestry.

Because of the large number of entries in the demonstration contests the county fair board has made a special listing of premiums for these contests. The winning team in each contest will receive a \$2.50 award. Enthusiasm with which the 4-H clubbers are approaching the fair would indicate that the club exhibits at this year's county fair will be the best in the history of the county.

LUKENS INTRIGUED BY STRANGE PRUNE

The tree sprang up some 10 years ago in rocky soil near the side of the Lukens barn and has been allowed to grow uncultivated. The yield this season is around a bushel.

Mr. and Mrs. Lukens are merchants during the day. Their interesting hobby is 55 various types of fruit propagated and raised on a 100 by 200 foot town lot.

REMEDY MAKES IT TOUGH FOR BEETLE

Dallas—A new substance for killing cucumber beetles has been tried out in the county during the past week and it looks like these little, striped and spotted bugs will have a tough time eating up gardens next year. Trials conducted by the county agent's office have given almost perfect kills. The material is a dust and is best applied when the air is still like in the early morning.

Trials conducted during the past several days were on the Homer Bevens and E. J. Page places at Dallas. A. F. Bennett at Crowley, Harry Walker at Oak Grove and R. D. Pence at Rickreall. Uniformly good results have been reported.

The material used is a slow acting substance and the beetles do not die for several hours after the application but begin to "pass out" after the first hour or so. The toxic part of the dust is a new substance just being experimented with and is known as an extract of Rotenol. It is not yet available on the general market.

FIRST LABISH ONIONS PULLED

Labish Center—First onion pulling of the season was done the first of the week, but it is expected that it will be about a week yet before the crop in general will be ready for harvest.

The crop in this district, which is the principal onion producing section of Oregon, is estimated to be normal or a little above normal in contrast to last year, which was an off year here. Losses due to the onion maggot last year were heavy, in many fields running as high as 50 per cent or better; while this year pest damage was negligible. Some fields did have quite heavy infestation of cut worms, but they can be poisoned quite easily.

Practically no mould has been encountered this year, but there has been some mildew and blight.

Set harvest, of which there are about 60 or 70 acres on the Hayes farms, is being completed at the present time.

Some buyers have been in the field looking the crop over but no offers have been made lately. Some sales of this year's crop are understood to have been made at 75c a hundred, however.
