

BOY BUILDERS' MODERN DAIRY BARN AT FAIR

Hayesville—An exceptionally interesting exhibit which will be on display at the Oregon state fair this year will be the fully modern dairy barn built by members of the boys' 4-H Builders club from Hayesville school. It will first be exhibited at the county fair which is being held at the Salem high school Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of this week, and then will be moved to the exhibit building at the fairgrounds.

The structure has been made from a blue print furnished by the Oregon Builders Congress. Carl Linde, architect, and "Star Line" dealers in dairy equipment. The barn contains 34 windows, 20 stanchions, two feed rooms, imitation cement floor made with paint and sand, two ladders to the loft, three openings from which to throw hay from the loft to the feed rooms below, hay fork and rack. The work is all very neat and expertly done by the boys under the supervision of their leader, E. L. Moor, assisted by Horace Smith.

A photo of the barn, incomplete however, was printed in the July issue of the "American Lumberman," taken in Salem at the 4-H Builders club exhibit show this summer. The barn has been sold to a prominent real estate dealer in Woodburn.

The material for the modern barn has been mostly donated by the following concerns: All hardware stores in Salem, Oregon Paper mill, Pressnell's Paint store, Building Supply Co., Portland Shingle Mill Co., Malita Shingle company, Seattle, Spaulding, Hanson Lumber, Copeland, Nelson Brothers, Gabriel Powder & Supply Co., and Cobbs Mitchell.

The club has been in progress for two years and has accomplished the following projects: Building a model poultry house which received first prize at the 1934 state fair; 10 benches for the Community club, two bicycle racks for the Hayesville school, 500 glasses glazed for green houses, two farm gates, carpenter's bench, 10 tool boxes, repair work at the schoolhouse, and the model dairy barn.

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Independence Merchants Provide Color for Fete With Wild West Flavor

Independence—With a large percentage of citizens sporting shirts, colored flaming kerchiefs, and green and orange hat bands, Independence has taken on a real wild west appearance in preparation for the annual Hop Fiesta to be held here Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

The big celebration will officially open Thursday at 11 o'clock when the crowning of the Fiesta queen is scheduled to take place at the Hop Bowl, Independence's civic stadium. Governor Charles H. Martin, Joseph K. Carson, mayor of Portland, Roy K. Terry, vice-president of the Rose Festival association, and many prominent men from various sections of the coast and valley will assist in the coronation ceremonies.

Other events on the opening day's program include an air circus in which many well-known northwest fliers will participate, and introduce, among other thrilling features, stunts in illuminated planes, a most spectacular aerial performance. A monstrous rodeo and floral parade will be held on the city streets beginning at 2 p. m. with many beautiful floats, cowboys, cowgirls, bands, drum corps and horses forming a most colorful cavalcade.

In the evening at the Hop Bowl Herb Owen will present a wrestling show, featuring some of the best known grapplers on the Pacific coast. The main event will bring together the much hated mat villain, Bulldog Jackson, and the titled English middleweight champion, Lord Landsdowne. This is a real grudge match, and will undoubtedly develop into a rough affair. Herb Owen, who is promoting the show, has arranged a strong supporting card which insures plenty of action during the entire card.

Dances and a street carnival will provide entertainment for visitors after the wrestling match is over.

Friday afternoon, a varied program of entertainment will be presented. Vaudeville, sports, athletic contests and many other interesting attractions are billed to take place. The rodeo will take place in the evening with many roundup stunts pitting their skill against the horses, steers and other range stock that has been assembled here by Ray Adams of Monmouth, who is in charge of this part of the Hop Fiesta celebration.

Saturday's program includes a pet parade, Indian pageant, sports events, rodeo championship show and other exciting features.

TIMBER BLAZE TAKES ACREAGE

Turner—Fire which started on the hillside in back of the Hawk farm on the Battle creek road burned over approximately 300 acres of both cut-over and timber land including land owned by the city on which the city water system reservoir is located, Monday. Fire fighters were dispatched to the scene as quickly as possible but despite their efforts some valuable timber was destroyed as well as about 50 cords of wood. Change of wind during the afternoon undoubtedly saved a great deal more timber as the direction of the fire changed to across the fields on the Porter place and southward. By evening the fire was under control.

Howard Baker who was cutting wood on the city owned land first reported the fire and that it was getting out of hand. Ten or 12 cords that Baker had recently cut was consumed in the blaze, as well as about 25 cords belonging to Bert Peables. Several other piles of cordwood owned by various parties were in the path of the blaze. Standing timber around the city's reservoir was burned but the fire was checked before reaching the timber around the spring which supplies the city's water. No definite information as to how the fire started was available Tuesday.
