

SILVERTON AIR BASE PROJECT HOPE BRIGHTER

Silverton—Two letters received Wednesday by George Custer and W. S. Jack, members of the committee on investigation, reveal definite action being taken concerning the possibilities of Silverton as a site for the proposed army air base.

At a meeting of a number of officials and business men of Silverton several weeks ago, Custer and Jack were appointed a committee to interview the governor in behalf of a petition signed by Silverton citizens, dated August 20, 1935, expressing a desire for the air base as provided in the Wilcox bill of August 12, 1935. The communications are the result of the conference with Governor Martin by the two men, Custer and Jack.

George H. Dern, secretary of war, in his reply to the governor states that "Your letter and inclosure have been referred to a committee which has been appointed to consider the establishment of air bases. Inspection of consideration of any particular site proposed, will not be practicable for some time to come."

The other communication is directed to Mr. Custer by the governor, and says: "I have just received a letter from Webster A. Jones, secretary of the state board of aeronautics stating that the petition of Silverton citizens for the proposed army air base will be presented at the next meeting of the state board of aeronautics."

BUDGETEERS CHOSEN

Subsequently Barrett filed a damage claim for \$100 against Worsley, also in justice court, to cover estimate cost of repairs to the plaintiff's car.

COLLEGE GETS GRANT

Albany—A grant of \$500, to be used as a revolving loan fund, has been given to Albany college by the Ben Selling estate, it was announced by Dr. Thomas W. Bibb, president. The money, which will be available immediately, is to be called the Ben Selling scholarship loan fund. For the present the loans will be confined to juniors and seniors.

DEMOLAYS GATHER

Albany—Housing for between 30 and 40 boys was lacking Thursday on the eve of the annual DeMolay convocation, which is to convene in Albany Friday, it was announced by committee members. DeMolay members from all parts of the state will convene to flock to Albany early Friday. The convocation is to be held in the Masonic hall.

SCHOOL BELLS CALL PUPILS SCIO, MONDAY

Scio—School bells will ring for approximately 200 students in the high school and grammar school at Scio Monday, E. P. Caldwell, seventh and eighth grade instructor, will also act as principal of the grade school.

J. H. Tumbleton, who comes here after five years' experience at Gervais, will be the new principal of the high school. Tumbleton received his bachelor of arts degree in education from Pacific university, and has done graduate work toward his master's degree in education at Oregon State college. He will instruct in science and mathematics. Tumbleton will be at the high school from 9 to 12 a.m., and from 1 to 4 p.m., the remainder of this week to assist students in special problems.

At a school board meeting Monday, Sept. 9, at which all members and the clerk were present, Miss Frances Patterson of Albany was chosen to fill the vacancy in the high school staff caused by the recent resignation of Miss LaVerne Moe. Miss Patterson will teach typing, shorthand, sewing, physical education, and girls' athletics. She received her bachelor's degree in physical education at Oregon State college in 1933, and has had a year of graduate work in secretarial science at that institution. She has had no experience in teaching. A salary of \$95 a month will be paid the new teacher.

Miss Bernice Newhouse will enter her third year as mentor in English and French. No Latin will be offered this year in the high school. Miss Newhouse will make her home with Mrs. V. J. Phillips.

Edell Elder returns to Scio in the capacity of boys' athletic coach and social science instructor.

High school time this year will be divided into six one hour periods. Registration will be held from 9 to 12 a.m., September 16. From 1 to 2:30 p.m., short classes will be conducted for the purpose of teachers' assignments.

Report cards this year will follow a new plan, there being a card for each subject. This system will greatly facilitate marking.

The Scio district will maintain two buses, as last year. Drivers, not yet definitely announced, will receive \$25 a month. A group of parents in the Rieverson section rent a bus from the Scio district and pay for its maintenance.

All persons are absolutely forbidden to walk on the floor of the gym without tennis shoes, the board ruled. The floor has been recently sanded at considerable expense.

TEACHERS RECEIVE SALARY INCREASES

Miss Marion White will teach the third and fourth grades as she did last year. She will make her home with her parents near West Scio.

Miss Gertrude Tarr is retained in the fifth and sixth grades. She and Mrs. Wilson will make their home with the P. H. MacDonald family.

E. P. Caldwell will enter his ninth year as seventh and eighth grade mentor. He will also be principal of the grades this year.

All Scio teachers have received salary increases of \$5 a month.

New Camp Cabins Are Constructed

Silverton—A long felt want of Silverton is being materialized in the new camp cabins that will soon be under construction by Lee Inman. The cabins will adjoin the Inman Union Oil station on Jersey and South Water streets and will be equipped with showers and other modern conveniences and most of them will have garage room.

The Pettyjohn building is being razed to make way for the cabins. Silverton's last vestige of a livery barn gave place to the service station recently established by Inman.

State Fair Week Victim Improves

LOW INTEREST RECORD BROKEN

Albany, Or.—Low interest rate records for municipal bond issues in Oregon were shattered Wednesday when seven financial houses bid for a \$25,500 block of city of Albany refunding bonds, according to Don R. Van Buskirk, representing the Atkinson-Jones company, Portland, successful bidder. The Atkinson-Jones company offered to purchase the entire issue under a 2 1/2 percent interest rate, giving a premium of \$33123 per \$100.

Commenting upon the bids, of which there were eight in all, Van Buskirk remarked, "These are the best offers for municipal bonds that I have ever seen, either in Oregon or anywhere else."

The next lowest bid was submitted by the Bank of Albany which offered to accept 2 3/4 percent interest and give a \$1250 premium on bonds numbered 142 to 178 comprising \$17,500 and 3 percent, giving a \$2060 premium for bonds numbered 177 to 212, all inclusive, totaling \$18,000.

Sale of these bonds completes refunding of a total of \$106,000 of the city's debt, accomplished this year. This comprises the total of bonds which the city can now legally refund, according to the city attorney.

Silverton—On account of the funeral services of Father Scherbring Monday the parochial school of St. Paul's Catholic parish will not open for classes until Tuesday, September 17. Father Scherbring was at one time pastor of the Silverton congregation.

Olivette. The teachers of the grades are Sister Mary Ulricha, primary department, and Sister Mary Annunciate in the advanced grades.

The attendance this year promises to exceed that of former terms.

MUSIC STUDIO OPENING SOON
