

SILVERTON TO SEE BIG CROWD PUPILS MONDAY

Silverton—The school buildings fairly shine with cleanliness, fresh varnished floors, calomined and painted walls and the lawns are green and newly mowed in readiness for the opening of schools Monday.

In the senior high school, Herman J. Kramer, principal, desires the pupils to meet at 9 o'clock in the general assembly hall where information will be given as to change in rooms and other differences. Registration will be done immediately after dismissal.

Kramer stated that the classes that were filling in faster than others were the mechanical drawing, manual training, art and home economics. Kramer will be at his desk during the forenoon before school opens Monday to receive prospective pupils.

Many pupils from the country districts have pre-registered.

Harold Davis, principal of the junior high school is keeping his office open for those who wish to consult him about the work. A number of pupils from the country districts are registering from the eighth grade and many have pre-registered from the spring term and visiting days.

The librarian, Gladys Fletcher, is on hand getting things in shape for book distribution.

From the superintendent's office is announced a change in bus routes. The Marquam bus will go out the Silverton-Marquam road to Marquam. After picking up the Marquam pupils it will come back through Mt. Angel and Bethany districts.

Tentative plans for a bus to go out through the eastern part of the Hazel Green district to the northern limits of North Howell and back through Central Howell and Bruah Creek are well underway. This would require a new bus.

Mr. Goetz, superintendent, is also principal of the grades, and is at the office each day.

The teachers are arriving, many from trips to Europe and the Orient, others from different states of the union where they took summer school courses, to be on hand for the teachers' meeting Saturday.

The largest attendance in the history of the school seems evident.
