

SLOT MACHINES ARE RULED OUT IN POLK COUNTY

JUDGE WALKER OPINION GOES AGAINST OWNER

Dallas—Slot machines lost out generally in Polk county Monday when Judge Arle G. Walker who had taken the case of N. J. Arnold vs. T. B. Hooker, as sheriff of Polk county and Bruce Spaulding, district attorney, under advisement, rendered a memorandum opinion declaring the slot machines now in operation in Polk county as being illegal.

The suit was based on the avowed intention of the sheriff and the district attorney to clean the county of the type of machines now in operation.

Judge Walker, in his opinion, held that the machine in question, designated as an "automatic skill device" differs from the old "nickel-in-the-slot machines" in that it has certain buttons on the front of it which the plaintiff contends control brakes upon the machine, and by use of these brakes the machine can be controlled so that the winning combinations can be secured. The plaintiff further contends, the opinion holds, that because of this breaking device an element of skill enters in the operation of the machine.

"Under the 1935 law municipal corporations and counties are empowered to license and regulate pin ball games, dart games and other games of like character involving an element of skill," reads the opinion. "These machines are undoubtedly unlawful under Section 14-746 because there can be no question but that an element of chance enters into the playing of the same, unless it can be said that these machines are of like character to be pin ball games, and dart games, and that they involve an element of skill. This being the exception made by the 1935 law cited."

After giving the matter careful consideration, it was the finding of the court that the machines are neither of like character with dart games and pin ball machines, nor do they involve an element of skill. Therefore the court held that the temporary restraining order be dissolved and that the suit be dismissed with the defendants recovering the costs of the case.

HOLY LAND PICTURES SHOWN BY MINISTER

Sheridan—Rev. William S. Burgoine, pastor of the Methodist church, began Sunday night to show pictures which he took in the Holy Land last year. Rev. Burgoine has had the pictures placed on slides and is presenting them to the public for the first time free of charge. The pictures show Sunday evening took the audience from Nazareth to the scenes of Christ's betrayal in the Garden of Gethsemane. The time expected to show all the pictures will be from a month to six weeks. They will take the audiences all through Palestine, and the Mediterranean world, revealing the life of the people, historic places and buildings, Nazareth, Jerusalem, Bethlehem, Dead Sea, Jordan river, Egypt, Italy, Africa, Turkey Asia and in all 27 nations in which Mr. Burgoine studied. They show life over a distance of 50,000 miles as it is today. The church was filled to capacity Sunday night.

NORMAL CAMPUS PLAN APPROVED

Monmouth—Bulletin No. 14 from the office of the Oregon state director, public works administration, C. C. Hockley, acting manager announced the approval by Washington headquarters of \$55,000 loan and \$45,000 grant for the construction of an administration building on the campus of the Oregon Normal school in Monmouth. A telegram from the office of Senator Frederick Steiwer in Washington, D. C., confirms the same.

In a letter from Hockley the state is felicitated on getting a very fair distribution of projects throughout the state and this in addition to a grant for a state capitol building. This makes the government's contribution \$4,470,000 in a \$10,000,000 construction program. This program must be in action not later than December 15 or the grant lapses.
