INDEPENDENCE SCHOOL BUDGET HAS INCREASE

Independence—The school budget as prepared for district No. 29 will show a slight increase in taxes over last year. The budget will be presented to the voters of the district Monday evening, November 14 at a meeting to be held in the training school auditorium.

The board, consisting of W. T. Hoffman, J. E. Kelley and E. A. Dunckel, directors; C. O. Irvine, clerk; R. M. Walker, E. O. Addison and Z. C. Kimball prepared the budget and will submit it for the tax payers consideration. The statement shows that the district has a bonded debt of \$18,500, with no outstanding warrants or other indebtedness. Aside from an allowance of \$1080, salary increases to training school teachers, there are few changes in the items listed. The increase in training teachers salaries was made necessary by state law, which makes minimum salary \$75 per month, an increase from \$65. The district pays only a part of the teachers' salary, the state paying the balance.

Anticipated receipts for 1936 are expected to be slightly less, due to falling off in registration in the training school. The treasurer's report shows that receipts for last year were about \$2000 in excess of the budget, the extra money coming from payment of delinquent taxes, and stated that this has been used in reducing outstanding warrants to the point of where the district was still on a cash basis at that date.

Notices for a school meeting to vote on the acceptance or rejection of the budget have been posted, calling the voters together November 14.

SCHOOL GYMNASIUM MAY BE ENLARGED

BUDGET ADOPTED BY INDEPENDENCE

Independence—The Independence city council at the special meeting adopted the 1936 budget of \$11,318.93, which was recommended by the budget board September 18th.

The new budget calls for \$1178 paid on street intersection bonds; \$2739 for lights and water; \$2000 to run the police department; \$1200 streets and sewers; and \$1000 on outstanding warrants and interest. These larger items in the budget account for \$8000 of the total bill and the balance of \$3000 for park, library, fire department, recorder, attorney, treasurer, elections and emergency.

The financial sheet of the city shows a total indebtedness of \$20,470, of which \$12,000 is for street improvement bonds; \$3,600 outstanding city warrants; \$3,000 library bonds; and \$2,800 street intersection bonds.
