

FARMER HELD SHEEP TAKER IN POLK JAIL

Independence—Gordon B. Bowman, a farmer and sheep raiser from south of Independence, is being held in Polk county jail awaiting sentence for theft of sheep. According to latest statistics many flocks in the valley have been ravaged during the past few weeks, and while Bowman does not admit all the plundering, he has admitted several head. About 400 or 500 head were reported stolen and the majority of these are pinned on the prisoner.

It is now thought that he has an accomplice and is shielding some one outside the county. Most of the sheep were taken from flocks in Polk county. Several head have been identified among flocks in Marion, Yamhill and Linn counties, and it is also reported that many were sold to packers and probably sent out of the state.

Bowman is pleading for leniency but the farmers are not in a mood to consider the matter a joke, as sheep are a valuable asset just at present. As high as 50 or 60 head have been missing from a flock, others of smaller amounts of 10 to 20 head. After the arrest was made following an investigation by the State police and sheriff's office, many farmers have been checking their flocks more closely and find some of their best animals missing. Bowman has been dealing in cattle and sheep quite extensively during the past few years, and came to this section from Marion county about two years ago.

Among the heaviest losers are Ernest Ziesch, Sam Hubbard, Albert Strake, George Wells, Carl Alexander, K. Williams, Charlie Smith, these all reside in Polk county.

GROCERY FIRM SUE

Albany—J. P. Carroll has filed suit in circuit court here asking \$10,000 damages from the Willamette Grocery company as the result of an accident near Harrisburg, October 3, in which Carroll and C. Darnelle were injured. Carroll alleges he was a guest in Darnelle's car, which was struck by a Willamette grocery company truck, due to negligence of the driver and to lack of proper lights on the truck. Darnelle earlier in the week filed a suit here asking \$36,350. This brings the total of claims to \$46,350 as a result of that wreck.
