### SCHOOL FUNDS MAILED

Albany—County School Superintendent J. M. Bennett has mailed to 126 school districts their 1935-36 apportionments of the common school and state elementary school funds. The common school fund is apportioned on the basis of \$100 for each district, plus \$3.30 per capita of school population, including persons between the ages of 4 and 20. The elementary fund is apportioned at the rate of \$143.80 per teacher unit. The total of the common fund distributed by the superintendent was \$36,725.26 and the total elementary apportionment was \$39,610.45.

### COUNTY VALUATION DECLINES IN POLK
