UPHEAVAL IN NIPPON OVER CHINESE CRISIS

Delay in North China Move Due to Conflict Between Leaders

British Influence Held Responsible by Pressure Brought in Tokyo

(By the Associated Press)
Possibility of an upheaval in the Japanese government over the north China situation was foreseen by Japanese political experts today, due to an abrupt halt in plans for making north China autonomous under protection of the Japanese army.

Well-informed sources in London said the British government was largely responsible for halting the move through political pressure in Tokyo and support of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek, the Chinese leader, at Nanking.
