SOUTHERN HILLS VACATION PLACE FOR PRESIDENT

Aboard Presidential Special En Route to Warm Springs, Ga., Nov. 21 (AP)—President Roosevelt returned to Dixie today to run the affairs of government for the next three weeks from his home deep in the Georgia hills.

Mr. Roosevelt took with him when he left Washington aboard a special train a mass of unfinished administration work he hopes to finish while at Warm Springs. Included were budget figures he plans to scan in frequent discussions with federal fiscal experts.

The president, since he was governor of New York state, has gone south to spend his Thanksgiving holidays with the infantile paralysis patients at the Warm Springs foundation which he established.

His schedule calls for him to remain at Warm Springs until December 8 when he will entrain for Chicago to address a meeting of the farmer leaders. The next day he will go to Notre Dame university at South Bend, Ind., where an honorary degree will be conferred upon him.

Mr. Roosevelt departed from Washington after a busy day. He heard reports from the state department on the European situation, looked over notes on progress of the work relief program and wound up a dozen other matters.

While at what he likes to refer to as "my other home," the president will inspect his 1,000 acre farm, scene of his agricultural experiments that included the raising of cattle to improve the herds in the southern states.
