A public hearing on the ordinance all relative to the managerial form of city government will be held tonight at the city hall, says an announcement by Alderman Fred A. Williams, chairman of the ordinance committee. The bill would submit the question to the people at the special election on January 31.

While this meeting is in progress the special water committee will be sitting with the city water commission at the water office for consideration of an ordinance bill calling for an issue of \$200,000 water bonds to start improvement of the distribution system. Surveys of prospective water sources which engineers have been employed to make will be discussed.

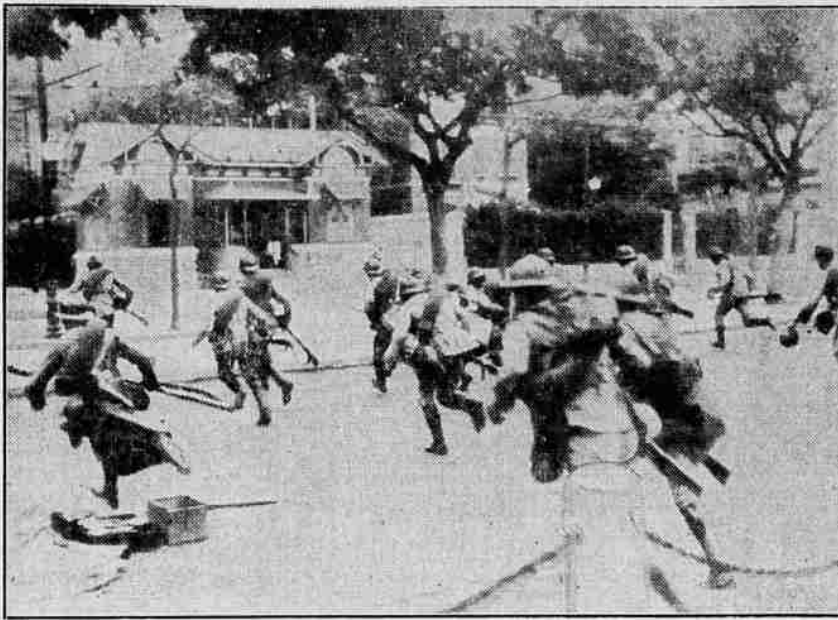
CRAMERS GO SOUTH

Washington, Dec. 13 (AP)—Convicted of conspiring to sell an appointment to West Point Representative John H. Hoepfel (D. Calif.), and his son, Charles, today planned a quick appeal. Father and son were found guilty shortly before midnight last night by a District of Columbia supreme court jury which deliberated six hours. Two years' imprisonment and \$10,000 fine is the maximum penalty for the offense.

POWER RATES CUT \$13,700 BY COPCO

A reduction in electric rates by the California and Oregon Power company to effect a saving of \$13,700 to rate payers in the Oregon territory was filed with the public utilities commissioner here today.

The reduced rates will be on the combination residential lighting, heating and cooking service. The tariff filed stated 5,335 customers in Medford, Klamath Falls, Grants Pass, Roseburg, Ashland and surrounding territory would benefit by the new tariff.

The reduction will become effective January 12.

Dates for hearings on the petitions for creation of the Northwest Oregon Bonneville People's utility district were set by the state hydro-electric commission today, the first of the series to be held January 10 at St. Helens.

The district would include most of seven counties—Clackamas, Clatsop, Washington, Yamhill, Lincoln, Polk and Columbia. The territory would also include 45 municipalities. The cities of Canby, Forest Grove and McMinnville would not be included since municipal power plants are already in operation in those places, the commission stated.

After the St. Helens meeting, the other dates were listed as follows: January 11 at Astoria, January 13 at Newport, January 18 at Dallas.
