The Keizer district has sold all of its first allotment and has asked for more, making a large increase in the sales of former seasons. Miss

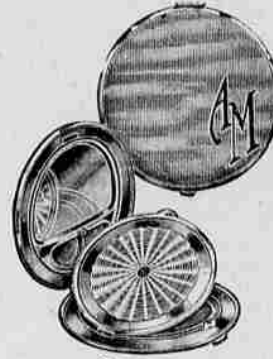
