HAUPTMANN DENIES MAKING CONFESSION

Trenton, N. J., Jan. 1 (AP)—Bruno Richard Hauptmann entered 1935 today with the knowledge that for him the new year may last less than a month if the state court of pardons rejects his plea for clemency.

The convicted slayer of the Lindbergh baby has been sentenced to die the week of January 13. The court of pardons will consider his appeal for mercy next week. Hauptmann's spiritual advisor, the Rev. John Mathiesen, a firm believer in his innocence, planned to visit the prisoner today.

Reports of a partial confession were again denied by Hauptmann in a talk with his wife, Anna. "I have nothing to confess," she quoted him as saying.

VANCOUVER MAYOR PASSES SUDDENLY

Vancouver, Wash., Jan. 1 (AP)—Vancouver was without a mayor today following the sudden death Tuesday afternoon of Mayor E. A. Hamilton, who died of an attack of angina pectoris at the age of 51. Mayor Hamilton took office in January, 1935, and had been a popular official. He reorganized much of the city's business.

Born in Albion, Neb., he came to Vancouver 30 years ago as a locomotive engineer for the Spokane, Portland and Seattle railway. He was survived by his widow, his mother, a daughter, a son and several brothers and sisters.

The city council will meet January 6 to elect one of its own members as his successor.

NEWSREEL BOYCOTT ON PASADENA GAME

Pasadena, Calif., Jan. 1 (AP)—Five major newsreel companies, angered because of an exclusive filming contract given by Stanford University to a company for filming the Rose Bowl football game, announced today they would not have any cameramen to photograph the game or Tournament of Roses parade.

Dart Games Illegal In Portland Today

Portland, Ore., Jan. 1 (AP)—Dart games became illegal in Portland today and police were instructed to arrest any who sought to operate tomorrow.

The council recently passed an ordinance declaring dart games illegal after their licenses of \$1,000 a year expired at the end of 1935.

One dart game proprietor yesterday attempted to force the city to accept his \$1,000 license fee for 1936 but it was refused. Another has operated all year in a city-owned building, an abandoned downtown fire house. The council directed that this game be evicted from the premises.

Proprietors of the dart games have indicated that they will make a legal fight to continue in operation.

BANDIT HUNT IN PHILIPPINES

Manila, Jan. 1 (AP)—The Philippine constabulary plunged into jungles of the Tayabas and Laguna provinces mountains today, continuing their relentless war of bandit extermination.

The bandit chieftain Teodoro Asedillo and three of his followers were killed yesterday, making the total of slain 29 since the outbreak began terrorizing the mountain people east of Manila last May. Eighteen robbers have been killed; the others were slain by bands led by Asedillo and Kulas Encallado.

Run to earth by constabulary in the Sierra Madre range, Asedillo and his gang fought it out with their pursuers. Asedillo, shot in face and abdomen, died almost instantly. His body was taken to Sampaloc, where villagers rejoiced that he was dead. Bodies of his companions were buried at the scene of the fight.

Encallado, with rewards of \$5,000 offered for his capture dead or alive, is skulking in the Sierra Madre of Laguna province.

How the body of Asedillo was tied on an improvised wooden cross by the frantic people of Sampaloc village was told by an eye witness, Jose Elbo, Santa Cruz correspondent of the Manila Bulletin.

The people whom the bandit leader had terrorized, Elbo said, cried out with joy when they heard Asedillo was dead. They took the body from an undertaker during the absence of soldiers, tied it to a cross and raised the cross in front of the municipal building and plucked out the hair.

BAR LINDBERGH FROM NEWS COLUMNS

Washington, Jan. 1 (AP)—The Washington Post today published the following notice in the form of a front-page box:

"The Lindberghs and the Post" "The Lindberghs landed safely in England yesterday and are on their way to a retreat in Wales. In deference to their desire for the privacy and human consideration to which every citizen is entitled, the Washington Post will give no further publicity to their purely personal affairs and family movements. The Post will always be interested in the Lindberghs as aviators, scientists, writers and outstanding Americans."

WELCOME PROBE OF 14 LYNCHINGS

Pasadena, Calif., Jan. 1 (AP)—The governors of Texas and California said here today they had no objection to a congressional inquiry proposed by United States Senator Van Nuys of Indiana into 14 lynchings since last May 1.

But Gov. James V. Alfred, of Texas, said he would be against the federal government going beyond the investigation point.

"I am not opposed to a federal investigation of the 14 lynchings," said Gov. Alfred. "But I am opposed to a further extension of federal powers. The states can cope with the situation adequately."

Said Gov. Frank P. Merriam, of California: "I have no objection to the proposed investigations as, like all inquiries, it would serve a good purpose. But if any further federal steps were proposed, I should have to study them before giving an opinion."

PLANS PERMANENT BUILDING PROGRAM

Washington, Jan. 1 (AP)—Legislation for a vast permanent public works and conservation program, including a potential \$20,000,000,000 low-cost housing plan, to supplement the present new deal alphabet agencies are being drafted today by Rep. Maury Maverick, D. Tex.

Maverick gathered material, opinions and facts for the program, which he will sponsor in a series of bills, on an automobile tour of 20 states in which he conferred with the "man in the street," gasoline station operators, tourists and others. "We must put aside political differences and stop spending the public's money through mismanagement and waste," Maverick said. "I am not criticizing the work of the alphabet agencies but we must get together on a permanent program. Surely, the administration now has sufficient experience and knowledge to undertake this permanent program."

other than that he is seeking quiet and peace," Gregory said, "definitely, he refuses to be interviewed."

The spokesman said the colonel's plans were still indefinite.

He declined to divulge when the family, which landed yesterday after a ten day voyage aboard the S. S. American Importer, was leaving Liverpool.

Questioned concerning reports that the Lindberghs were going to the French Riviera or to South Wales, he reiterated that their plans were indefinite.

Gregory issued a short statement from Colonel Lindbergh which said: "I am very pleased by the consideration shown myself and family, and I am looking forward to quiet and rest in this country. As I told immigration officers on landing, my visit here is not connected in any way with business."

Asked how long Lindbergh was remaining in England, Gregory replied, "He is on a six months visa."

"Is he going to renew the visa?" "That depends on circumstances," Gregory said. "Whether Lindbergh intended to surrender his American citizenship and live in England or elsewhere permanently, Gregory replied, "Not that I know of."

Gregory said the Lindberghs had not communicated with the family of J. Llewellyn Morgan, father of Aubrey Neil Morgan, brother-in-law of Mrs. Lindbergh, at Llandaff, Wales, and reports they were going there to stay were untrue.

"The Lindberghs spent New Year's eve quietly in their Adelphi hotel suite and went to bed early."

Gregory said three-year-old Jon was fit and well, and enjoyed the transatlantic voyage.

A dark, misty New Year's day greeted the Lindberghs for their second day ashore.

LIVESTOCK MART REFLECTS STRENGTH

Chicago, Jan. 1 (AP)—Livestock receipts in semi-holiday proportions despite the fact that stockyards business was in full swing today gave the hog and cattle markets a strong tone. Hogs were steady to 15 cents higher than Tuesday's average and cattle were steady to 25 cents up.

The hog market top of \$9.55 was actually a dime lower than yesterday's best price because of the fact that there was no improvement in the value of light hogs, which lately have been commanding the highest bids. Most strength today centered around heavier hogs, with the bulk of 210 to 300 pounders selling at \$8.75 to \$9.55. The bulk of desirable lights sold at \$8.40 to \$9.60.

Receipts totaled 9,000, half of which were direct. This run was well below normal for the season.

Better grade fed steers and yearling ailed strong to 25 cents higher and others were steady to strong. The market was slow, however, due partly to the fact that asking prices in early rounds were well above the ideas of most buyers. Best fed steers topped at \$13.60 early but prime cattle were held about a dollar higher.

Fat lambs had a steady to 15 cents lower tone but sheep were strong to 25 cents and more higher. The top for slaughter lambs was \$11.25.

Carson until he struck him. He was extremely nervous after the accident, but had not been drinking, the officers stated. Witnesses estimated his rate of speed from 20 to 25 miles an hour while Barrett stated he was driving between 20 and 25 miles an hour.

District Attorney Trindle today stated that full prosecution would be made but whether or not it would be on the basis of involuntary manslaughter or not he was not prepared to state. The case, he said, was one involving the most flagrant violation of traffic laws, resulting in a fatality, that had come to his attention. Coroner L. E. Barwick was still undecided today whether or not an inquest would be held.

Carson, who lived at 679 North Cottage street for the past year, made his home here for many years until five years ago when he went to Woodland, Wash., to publish a newspaper, returning to Salem about a year ago. He had been admitted to the bar after studying law in the office of District Attorney Trindle and in addition had taught in several rural schools in the community.

MILLION VIEW ROSE PARADE AT PASADENA

Pasadena, Calif., Jan. 1 (AP)—An eager throng estimated at more than a million persons saw history told brilliantly in flowers as the Tournament of Roses floats moved through Pasadena's thoroughfares today.

Governor James V. Alfred of Texas, who sought the biggest single invasion to California for the Rose Bowl game, rode with Governor Frank P. Merriam, of California, at the head of the procession.

Clearing skies, which followed stormy, threatening weather, left a ribbon of flowers nodding in the warm sun. Sidewalks and cross streets were jammed with watchers.

South Pasadena, which told the courtship of Louis XVI and Marie Antoinette in the gardens of Versailles, won the sweepstakes prize. Peacocks and fountains were fashioned from 90,000 roses, narcissi, lilies of the valley, sweet peas, stock, larkspur, delphinium and steevia, forming the setting for costumed figures. The float was followed by five Ethiopian outriders.

The grand prize paid tribute to Will Rogers. A gold star of flowery representation America's loss by the actor-humorist's death. A mid-crisis horse with reins trailing indicated his unfinished work. It was entered by the Union Oil company.

The float, "The Pilgrims," won the prize for most fittingly representing the tournament theme—history in flowers. It pictured the third Plymouth church in a setting of fir, cedar, spruce and pine, a meadow sloping from it. This was entered by Glendale.

Special awards were made to Texas, with its "Remember the Alamo" theme float; to Australia, whose float formed a setting for its most beautiful girl, Peggy Gamble, and to Portland.

MARTIN SEES OREGON FUTURE

Portland, Jan. 1 (AP)—Governor Martin told the people of Oregon in a New Year's greeting last night that "the regeneration of our great state is in the making."

"We are at the beginning," he said, "of a new era that can properly be called the Oregon renaissance." "A mighty drama is about to be enacted on the Pacific coast," Oregon's governor continued, "with Oregon furnishing the setting. We are the players and the success of the momentous drama depends on us and how well we play our respective parts."

Governor Martin said that economists of outstanding reputation declare the greatest development of our nation's history is about to begin in the northwest with Oregon as the focal point. He mentioned Bonneville dam and the Willamette valley project, the five Oregon coast highway bridges, and the extensive construction of private and public buildings "from Ontario to Astoria."

"Oregon," he said, "is about to take her rightful place in the sun. What we need during this great epoch upon which we enter is a great and illuminating faith. We need a greater love of state and country, and a finer appreciation of the gifts that have been so unstintingly bestowed upon us."

TOWNSEND PLAN MENACES SECURITY

Boston, Jan. 1 (AP)—The Townsend plan, Governor James M. Curley said in an oblique reference to it today in his annual message, may jeopardize the Roosevelt administration social security plan.

"Although many thousands of well-intentioned Americans believe that the social security program does not go far enough," he remarked, "in the judgment of competent authorities it is the one plan which the public is prepared to accept."

"Acceptance, however, may be jeopardized by other plans, which, while representing good intentions and a desire to solve a tremendous problem, may destroy the real objective sought namely, the welfare of the entire world."

St. Helena, Ore., Jan. 1 (AP)—H. P. Brown, manager of the Western Acceptance company of San Francisco, said today 125 acres of filberts had been planted in Yamhill county and that several tracts of the plantings already had been sold to Californians. He also said between 300 and 400 more acres would be planted and a warehouse would be constructed in the Yamhill county area in 1936.

papers broadcast the news. All public celebrations for the New Year were called off and parties gathered instead to pay tribute to the dead.

The Norwegian and Finnish premier issued statements to the press today sympathizing with Sweden and forecasting serious international repercussions.

The Norwegian premier said world opinion against Italy would be strengthened, particularly in Norway which had sent an ambulance to Ethiopia.

"I lack words to express what I think about that abominable crime," the Finnish premier said of the bombing.

An investigation was demanded by the Swedish Red Cross of the International Red Cross board at Geneva.

Archbishop Erling Eidem said in a message broadcast last night: "The old year sets in blood not only for Africa but for the whole world. With horror we look down on the abyss opened by national egoism. These, our brothers, went out to serve, knowing the risks. They have given us all a noble example. We thank God they were Swedish men."

(By Associated Press) Italy and Ethiopia exchanged bitter recriminations today over their warfare's newest cause celebre—the fascist aerial bombardment Monday on the southern front.

Emperor Haile Selassie, from his field headquarters at Dessay, telegraphed a protest to the League of Nations, charging Italy with using poison gas in the attack and with effecting "complete destruction of a Swedish Red Cross ambulance."

The Rome government, in turn, countered with an official communication insisting: "The bombardment which took place on the Somali front was fully justified by the proved fact that two Italian aviators who fell at Dagha Bur were killed and decapitated, and their heads carried to Harar in triumph."

From the rival government communications, outlines of what actually occurred in the bombardment on the Guenale Doria river, about 30 miles north of Dola, began to emerge.

Original indications were that only a Swedish ambulance, in the Ethiopian version of the incident, was attacked.

Haile Selassie's protest indicated that Ethiopian troop concentrations came under the bombardment. The Rome communication confirmed these indications:

"The Italian planes did not mean to bomb tents of the Swedish Red Cross and other Red Crosses, although it is well known that Ethiopian chiefs take shelter under Red Cross signs when they see Italian airplanes."

Although first Ethiopian reports said nine Swedes and 23 Ethiopians of an ambulance unit died in the assault, the Italian government reported:

"News of the number of dead is not definitely stated." "The Swedish Red Cross unit was believed by Ethiopian officials themselves to have been in the heart of their troop masses which have been menacing Gen. Rudolfo Graziani's army on the Ethiopian-Italian Somali front."
