

STAYTON CHURCH HOST FOR SANTIAM CONVENTION

200 DELEGATES ARE EXPECTED SUNDAY RITES

Stayton—About 200 delegates from ten communities representing 17 churches in the Santiam district are planning to attend the quarterly Sunday school convention scheduled for the Stayton Methodist church, Sunday, Harry Monroe, district president, will be in charge with Mrs. Tom Taylor, Stayton, secretary.

This is the first meeting of groups in Stayton for two years. The last time the convention met here, the Baptist church was host. The conferences are held four times every year and the place of meeting rotated among the ten communities.

The general convention theme will be "In His Service," and all study discussions and addresses will deal with this subject.

Rev. Ralph Kleen, pastor of the Methodist church here, will address the meeting at the morning session, and in the afternoon, Rev. Milo C. Ross, pastor of a church near Salem.

A business meeting and special numbers will follow. At 3 o'clock the address of Rev. Ross will conclude the program.

Stayton, Turner and Aumsville have representatives from three churches each while Mill City will send delegates from two churches.

The following communities will have one church representation: Detroit, Clatsop, Lyons, Mehama, North Santiam and Rock Point.
