

CURTIS TALKS ON BOY SCOUTS' NEW PROGRAM

Success or failure of the scouting program is up to the district chairman, declared E. L. Curtis, regional executive of Spokane, in addressing members of the planning conference of Cascade area council who met at the First Methodist Episcopal church in an all day session Wednesday. He then went ahead to outline recommendations, which if carried out, would result in better programs and continuous interest in scouting.

Nationally, Curtis said, scouting had made fair progress during 1935. While numerically Cascade area had slipped to some degree in recent years, he expressed the opinion more real interest in scouting is being evinced than for some time.

Taking up the various committee jobs, in order, the speaker made the following recommendations:

Secure own summer camp site; foster the camp-fire, stimulate greater interest in the court of honor; give the local executive prompt financial backing, and make definite plans for a comprehensive training course.

Curtis pointed out that joining with Willamette council in its summer camp was not entirely successful since the number of boys taking part from the Cascade area was considerably below the average.

In closing the regional executive urged the various committees, which met during the afternoon, to set up programs which will constitute a challenge but which will not be overdone.

A. C. Haas, president of the council, presided during the morning hours and called upon Jim Monroe, area executive, to outline the work accomplished during the past 12 months.

This evening at 6:45 the annual banquet will be held in the church dining room. Dr. Bruce R. Baxter, president of Willamette university, will be the principal speaker, while Governor Charles H. Martin will make the presentation of awards.

adviser, the Rev. John Matthiesen of Trenton, after visiting him yesterday, reassured belief in his innocence and reported him "hopeful and cheerful."

Mr. Matthiesen, asked whether he believed the clemency move would fail and that Hauptmann would die, said, "The Lord does strange things."

The clergyman, commenting on his visit to Hauptmann, said: "Sometimes when you go in there depressed, Hauptmann uplifts you."

During their talk yesterday, Mr. Matthiesen quoted the Biblical verse:

"And, lo, I am with you always even unto the end of the world."

Hauptmann smiled, he said, and observed that was his confirmation verse as a boy in Germany.

Their conversation turned to the Flemington trial. The condemned man was quoted as saying that Attorney General David T. Wilentz, during cross-examination, shot questions at him so fast he was unable to collect his thoughts to respond properly in English.

Hauptmann indicated his confidence that he would not die in the chair when he pointed to the entrance to the death chamber and said to Mr. Matthiesen:

"I won't go out that door."

"I'll go out that one," he added, pointing to the exit from the death house.

IOWA FARMERS DENY UPRISING OVER DECISION

Des Moines, Ia., Jan. 8 (P)—Iowa farm leaders discounted today the suggestion that the supreme court's decision knocking out the AAA might precipitate a midwestern farm uprising.

But they united in asserting that Iowa farmers, who had more at stake in the decision than those of any other state, will make themselves loudly heard in their demands for a new farm program.

They discounted the incident at Ames in which the six supreme court justices who voted against the AAA were hung in effigy, as "a college boys' prank," in no wise indicative of the true farm sentiment.

They pointed to the 76 per cent increase in the Iowa farm price index during the last two years, and the sharp upturn in Iowa farm income, as evidences that the present situation is one to breed contentment, rather than discontent.

They also pointed out that farm groups which sponsored the farm rebellion three years ago have opposed the AAA from the beginning.

Ray Murray, state secretary of agriculture, said "farmers have no thought of resorting to violence, but they are no less determined to press their demands for a permanent farm program."

R. K. Bliss, director of the Iowa extension service, declared, "there is a deep-seated conviction among farmers that they should enjoy the same protection and unity as

sponsors of the bill defended the no refund provision on the grounds that veteran administration authorities claimed that the total amount affected would be less than \$7,000,000 and that there would be no adequate means of checking the interest payments, since many were made through closed banks.

Members asked Doughton if the president favored the bill and he replied, not to my knowledge."

Sponsors of the bill agreed to oppose all amendments "not backed by the ways and means committee."

House leaders predicted overwhelming passage of the bill since previously disagreeing bonus factions in the house have consolidated behind it.

It will be sent to the senate as soon as the final vote is cast in the house.

FIRMER BASIS FOR WPA PLAN OF THIS YEAR

Washington, Jan. 8 (P)—A new congressional appropriation of \$1,500,000,000 to establish the works progress administration on a permanent basis features new deal work-relief plans for the 1936-1937 fiscal year, it was indicated today.

An allocation that size would increase the government's next annual deficit to \$2,358,000,000 compared to the \$2,324,000,000 estimated for 1936.

Authoritative sources said President Roosevelt was preparing to submit these recommendations to congress around March 15:

1—\$1,500,000,000 for Harry L. Hopkins' WPA to make jobs for around 2,750,000 needy for 12 months after July 1.

2—Continuation of the public works administration, which now money for construction loans and grants to political subdivisions. Administrator Harold L. Ickes still would have a \$500,000,000 revolving fund for lending.

The \$1,500,000,000 will not be the only sum the government will spend during 1936-1937 for work-relief. Mr. Roosevelt estimated in his budget message that \$1,103,000,000 of past WPA and PWA appropriations would be unspent July 1. It all has been obligated, however.

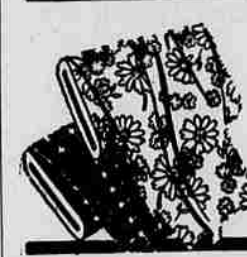
The new appropriation was tentatively decided upon by Mr. Roosevelt and Hopkins from figures showing that, up to Dec. 19, WPA had spent or allocated \$1,100,000,000 to make work for 2,678,629 persons.

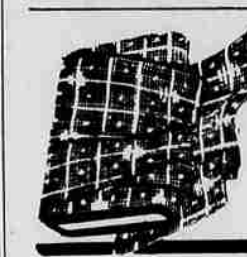


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
