

ADULT CLASSES FEDERAL PLANS GETTING START

Silverton—Thursday marked the close of the adult classes planned in the fall by Robert Goetz, superintendent of schools, in reference to the newly formed groups under the federal WPA program.

George Birrell of Salem, acting for Silas Gaiser, superintendent of Salem schools, and for Mrs. Mary L. Fulkerson, county superintendent, is personally supervising the establishment of the WPA classes in Silverton as well as at Mt. Angel, Fairfield, St. Louis, Gervais, Liberty, Salem Heights and Salem.

The Silverton classes meet on Tuesday and Friday of each week from 7:15 to 9:15 o'clock in the evening at the Junior high (Washington Irving) building. Attendance must be over 16 years of age and not attending any public school. Classes a week ago, with the largest enrollment in Diesel engines were more than 30. Courses of instruction will continue through May with registration open for new entrants to classes through next week. The student merely contacts the instructor and enters the class with no financial obligation.

Among the instructors are Mrs. Lela Shepherd of Silverton in an Americanization class. This is especially valuable for those who desire to become citizens of the United States and is helpful to any one interested in civics and history or any phase of patriotic study. Mrs. Shepherd is starting her work this week. E. O. Bushnell of Salem is teaching Diesel engines; James Stitt is directing the work in a class in radio, and Isaac Waltonians please take note, a class in fly-tying is promising much popularity and is taught by Elmer Eastridge. A class in vocal music may be organized if sufficient interest is shown. The schedule is so arranged that one person may take any two of the classes.

Until further notice, Mr. Birrell announces the class in radio will meet only on Tuesdays and is eligible for beginners as well as advanced students in radio.

Interesting classes, also by these same instructors, are being conducted at the TB hospital and at the industrial schools for both boys and girls with high school credits granted for the class work. This is in English, French and music.

Fifteen instructors are operating throughout Marion county in this project.

Material Advancement Made by Scio Through Period Just Completed

Scio—The year just closed has witnessed material advancement in Scio. For the first time since the economic lull struck, property owners and business men have planned and many have executed improvements that have added much to the value of their properties.

A new home for the Scio Mill & Elevator company, which was destroyed by fire during the late summer of 1928, has been planned on the old hotel property here which was used until the big fire seven years ago. The company has been operating in a location on Main street since the fire, but a more spacious location is deemed necessary. The hotel buildings will be razed in the spring to give way for the mill buildings, it is announced.

The school gymnasium has undergone changes calculated to enhance its value for school activities. The floor has been sanded and rows of seats about the walls will now accommodate spectators in much larger numbers than ever before. Improvements at the school grounds include racks and housing for bicycles of students employing that method of transportation.

Considerable money has been spent on Scio streets and further improvements are contemplated as soon as weather conditions will permit.

Not a residence is available in the city, all having been occupied for some time. New work and remodeling of residences have been more active during the last year than for several years.

Organization of a chamber of commerce a few months ago prefaces activity of a civic nature that will rebound to the progress of Scio and vicinity.

Schools and churches have made progress. With a view of promoting educational interests here, there is a strong desire on the part of leaders in the work for a new and modern high school building. Advocates of the plan point out that the present building, erected 40 years ago could be remodeled for grade purposes, as it is rapidly outgrowing its usefulness for best high school work.
