

TWO TOES LOST LEG BROKEN IN AUTO CRASHES

Myrtle Purcell of Salem is in the Salem General hospital with serious injuries from a traffic accident at the Taylor creek bridge south of Salem Sunday afternoon. In the Salem Deaconess hospital Enoch Maerz, 1191 Third street, West Salem, is suffering with a badly fractured left leg resulting from a collision late Saturday between his motorcycle and an automobile driven by George E. Tucker, 2810 Laurel avenue.

Only one car was involved in the accident in which Myrtle Purcell was injured. After she had been taken to the hospital the driver of the car, Wilbur Marquardt, was arrested at the hospital by a state police officer on a charge of being drunk in a public place. It was said that he insisted on visiting the injured woman in her room against the orders of the hospital nurses. He took 24 hours in which to decide on a plea when arraigned today and posted bail.

The injured woman suffered the loss of two toes, it was said at the hospital, a severe head laceration and suffered much from loss of blood and shock. Her condition was improved today.

The car, which was driven by Marquardt, and with whom were the Purcell woman, her sister, Alva Hall, 259 Brea avenue, and Loren Loose of Salem, crashed into the bridge at Taylor's creek. No others in the party received more than minor scratches or cuts. The car was badly damaged.

A passing motorist whose name was not learned took the injured woman to the hospital. A passing taxicab brought the others of the party to Salem.

The accident resulting in a broken leg for Enoch Maerz happened at Cottage and Center streets. Maerz was riding a motorcycle owned by the Little Lady's Store. He was riding west on Center and Tucker, driving east on Center was turning north on Cottage when he crashed into the motorcycle. It was expected that a reckless driving charge would be filed against Tucker today. Both bones of Maerz' left leg were broken between ankle and knee.

MAHONEY TO RUN FOR U. S. SENATE

Portland, Jan. 13 (AP)—Willis E. Mahoney, mayor of Klamath Falls, stood today as a democratic candidate, on the Townsend platform, for United States senator from Oregon.

The youthful Klamath man told a Jackson day meeting here Saturday he would oppose Republican Senator Charles L. McNary for the congressional post.

"The Townsend plan," Mahoney said, "is the key to the return of national prosperity. It is the one plan that will end unemployment in America. It is the one plan that will restore purchasing power into the hands of the masses and, beyond all of that, it pays a just debt which a government owes to its aged people."

Mahoney said "I will accept the call. I will file as a Jackson democrat and beat McNary."

PLAN TO START CONSTRUCTION OF HIGH SCHOOL

With the expectation that final approval of the contract would be issued today by PWA officials, the Hoffman Construction company plans to start excavation in connection with the building of the Salem senior high school building later in the week, according to a communication received this morning by Walter B. Minier, chairman of the board, from L. H. Hoffman. No particular ceremonies incident to turn the first earth for the more than a half million dollar project have as yet been announced.

In his communication Hoffman states that he is sending G. L. Hannan to superintendent the construction of the building. Hannan will move to Salem with his family immediately. He has recently been employed by the PWA in the office of the state engineer inspector. He had charge of the addition to the Salem postoffice for Charles Weltz Sons. John R. Barfield will be his assistant.

Hoffman announces the awarding of bids to the following sub-contractors:

Smith. Acoustical treatment, Asbestos Supply company. Painting, Williamsen and Bleid. Stage equipment, Northern School Supply company. Plumbing and heating, Hastorf, Inc.

Wiring, W. R. Graale. Lumber will be purchased from the Silver Falls Lumber company and cement from the Oregon Portland Cement company.

"It is our intention to purchase as much material locally and to use as many local subcontractors as is possible," Hoffman states. Although the dwellings which occupy the site of the new structure have not been moved, excavation along 14th street can get under way regardless, it is said.

U. of O., Eugene, Jan. 13.—A record breaking number of representatives from newspapers all over the state is expected to gather on the University of Oregon campus for the 18th annual Oregon state press conference January 16, 17 and 18, it has been announced by Dean Eric W. Allen of the school of journalism.

A number of new features have been added to the program this year, including discussion and addresses on offset printing and small engraving plants. Donald J. W. V. FULLER RESIGNS POST

Dallas, Or., Jan. 13.—With the announcement of the resignation of W. V. Fuller from the position of publicity director of the Oregon state board of forestry there passes into private life one of the most picturesque figures ever associated with the timely work of forest conservation. Ten years ago he launched into every nook and cranny of the state and, in addition, reach into adjoining states.

It is his boast that the "Show Boat," the truck which carried his equipment and supplies, is known to every town and hamlet in the state at large. Programs have been given in every form of educational institution, from the lowly grade school to the colleges, to the public in general during the last three years in all CCC camps. In his tenure of office he estimates that he has established direct contact with over 2,000,000 people.

The program which was handled via the "Show Boat" is sponsored by the United States forest service, the Oregon state board of forestry and the Oregon fire association. His successor is H. A. Thomas, named by the new state forester, J. W. Ferguson, and recommended very highly by Fuller when he tendered his resignation.

Plans for the future include the supervision of his personal interests in the county and the establishment of a brokerage office with the handling of timber land as its special business.

CCC CAMPS TO BE REOCCUPIED

Medford, Jan. 13 (AP)—Five new CCC companies will arrive from the midwest this week to bring the Medford CCC district back to a strength of 22 camps.

The companies will reoccupy camps Steamboat, Wimer, Gasquet, Clear Lake and Applegate, which were vacated last week when four second corps area and three ninth corps area companies were disbanded.

Only two camps which were vacated will not be reoccupied for the present period. They are Coos Head, near Marshfield, and Elk Creek, near Medford. Coos Head's company was not disbanded but moved to Camp Siskum when the second corps area company there was sent home. Three special trains are bringing the five new companies to this district. The first left Two Harbors, Minn., January 12 with Co. 709, for Camp Gasquet and Co. 4742 for Camp Wimer. It will arrive about January 15.

The second also left January 12 with Co. 2702 from Two Harbors, Minn., for Camp Applegate and Co. 703 from Allen Junction, Minn., for Camp Steamboat.

Another special train was to leave Madison, Neb., January 14 with Co. 4740 for Camp Clear Lake.

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
