BEARCATS AND TEACHERS PLAY DOUBLE HEADER

The strong Oregon State Normal basketball squad, virtually intact from last season, will engage Willamette university in a game court schedule on the local floor at 7:30 o'clock tonight. The Bearcats reserves, who dropped a clash with Valley Packing Friday night, will meet Coach Al Cox's second teacher string in the first encounter. The second game to follow immediately will feature the so-called first strings of the two institutions.

The Wolves boast one of the strongest outfits in a number of years and are favored to take both contests from the Bearcats. In Ystad and Averill, the teachers have two flashy forwards, while Butterworth is a high scoring center.

The showing of the Bearcats against the Packers and Multnomah club proved a bitter disappointment to Coach Keene Friday night and if improvement is not exhibited tonight some radical changes may result.

Late this week Coach Keene will take his crew to Ashland where two games with Southern Oregon normal have been scheduled for Friday and Saturday nights.

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Beaten Salem, Astoria Teams Credited With Best Chances Title

The Salem and Astoria high basketball teams suffered defeats the past week, but it's a one to two bet that one of the teams wins the state championship. For of 16 state

season. Ted Sarpola, all-state forward, was back in the Astoria line-up. Salem, which like Astoria is a good tournament team, beat Mill City 49 to 15, lost to Medford 18 to 22, beat Ashland 30 to 17, and then wilted Saturday night and lost to Ashland 23 to 16. Despite the in-and-out showing, Salem is enthusiastic over the big men Coach Hollis Huntington has assembled. All but one of the regulars are six feet or taller, in contrast to recent Salem teams. Medford forced to the limelight with its win over Salem and a 24 to 16 win over Weed, Cal.

Marshfield came to the front in the Coos Bay region by a 38 to 25 win over Bandon, which had beaten Coquille 30 to 20. Marshfield also beat Riverton 33 to 13. Pendleton impressed with a 36 to 27 win over Baker.

Coach Dwight French's Klamath Pelicans gobbled up Bend high 32 to 29. Springfield handed Albany its first defeat, 30 to 27.

Russ Rarey's Tillamook Cheese-makers continued their long string of victories by beating Oregon City 27 to 26.

The Portland prep league opening comes Friday night when all eight teams swing into action at once with great fanfare. Five and possibly six of the Portland teams are rated stronger than last year.

Benson, last year's champion, is rather weaker, but Coach Leonard Gherke of Jefferson says his last year's runner-up probably will be stronger. Coach Dave Wright, whose Lincoln team finished third, says his team will be weaker, but other coaches won't believe it. Prospects are not even as good—if that's possible—for Roosevelt, last year's cellar team. Franklin, Washington, Grant and Commerce all expect much improved teams.

Astoria has three representatives on the squad—Bob Anet, Wallace Johansen and Henry Nilson. Two players who were named on the all-state team following the tournament last March have cast their lot with "Honest" John Warren—Lauren Gale, former Oakridge center and Anet, Fisherman guard. Nilson was awarded the "best sportsman" trophy last March.

As far as height is concerned the Ducks are not particularly outstanding—Der Phelps, a center from Hood River and Gale having the most altitude each six feet four. Gail Pouts of Walla Walla is a close second with 6 feet 3. Gordon Fleming, Milwaukee; Rodney Hansen, Olympia; Leonard Heller, Portland; George Jackson, Grants Pass; Henry Nilson, Astoria; Gale Smith, Portland, and Don Yeager, Portland, are all six feet or better.

"Medford won on their great fighting spirit. I've seldom seen a team fight like they did. When they get more experience they're going to be a tough club to beat, judging by the way they are taking the ball off the backboard from men a half head taller." Such was the comment of Coach Huntington following the game between Salem and Medford as published by the Mail Tribune.

Willamette university entertains Monmouth Normal at Salem tonight and then journeys to Ashland to meet Southern Oregon Normal Friday and Saturday nights.

University of Portland plays at College of Puget Sound tonight and tomorrow night, and at Linfield college Thursday night.

The Portland Buckaroos open the stretch drive for the northwestern ice hockey league championship when they play the Vancouver Lions in Portland Thursday night.

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HINES HAS PLACE IN GOLF HISTORY

Los Angeles, Jan. 13 (AP)—Jimmy Hines, Garden City, L. I., Pro, today had assured himself a place among leading links stars of 1935 following his four stroke victory in the \$5,000 Los Angeles open golf tournament.

Hines, virtually an unknown to western golfers until two weeks ago when he bagged the \$3,000 Riverside, Cal., open, had to fight off a bad case of nerves as well as the challenge of Henry Picard of Hershey, Pa., before he won yesterday.

Starting his last 18 holes with an aggregate of 206, three strokes ahead of Picard, Hines continued his par-breaking golf until the 15th hole then he began to waver.

Only the fact that Picard also blew up on his last few holes kept Hines from losing his head as he finished with a 280 and collected \$1,500. Picard finished with a 284, tied with Jimmy Thompson of Ridgewood, N. J., for second.

Vic Ghezzi, defending champion, got a tie with Mark Fry of Alameda, Cal., with 285 for fourth.

Horton Smith of Chicago finished sixth at 186, one stroke ahead of Byron Nelson. Bracketed at 283 were Harry Cooper, Al Zimmerman, Portland, Ore., Ky Laffoon, and Willie Goggin.
