

WHEAT RALLY SHORT LIVED

Chicago, Jan. 13 (AP) — Virtually disregarding the United States supreme court process tax decision in the Rice millers' case, wheat averaged lower today.

There was a short-lived rally on values following the decision, but traders afterward concluded the status of taxes actually collected remained in doubt. Under such circumstances, prices again sagged.

Wheat closed unstable at the same as yesterday's finish to 1 cent lower, May 1.00-1.00 1/4, corn 1/4-1/2 down, May .97-58, oats unchanged and off, and provisions varying from 20 cents setback to a rise of 1 cent.

Confronted by a tone wall at Winnipeg, wheat traders went mostly to the selling side at the start today, but prices afterward rallied and scored gains.

Selling pressure that temporarily dominated values and caused downward turns of a cent a bushel, was associated with uncertainty as to how much the Canadian government's board would continue to dispose of before permitting a rise. On the

obvious the Washington administration proposed to submit to congress a fresh domestic crop control program. It was asserted this program likely would be enacted with little delay, and that this should especially tend to lift new crop futures. Contributing to rallies was talk that a more active demand for flour cannot be much longer postponed. Assertions were also current that
