

GYMNASIUM HAS CLASSIC LINES AND UNDER WAY

Work has already been begun on the foundations for the new gymnasium at Mt. Angel college, though rapid progress cannot be expected until after the rainy season. The latest addition to the college plant will be located at the western crest of the hilltop just beyond the parking of the road.

In general the architecture of the new building will conform with that of the rest of the buildings. It will be a one story structure, 155 by 89 feet, of reinforced concrete to be faced with buff brick and trimmed with terra cotta.

The western or main facade of the building will be monumental in type, the windows being grouped to give the effect of vertical columns, thereby adding an appearance of height.

The building will offer facilities not only for the indoor sports but also for dramatics, music and art. The basketball court, 90 by 50 with five feet of free space on all sides, will occupy the main part of the building. To either side of the court there will be bleachers, while the space under the bleachers will be utilized for showers, equipment rooms, etc.

To the south of the court the handball court, 60 by 25, will extend, while a similar wing to the north will contain the stage and dressing rooms. Above the dressing rooms there will be room for an art studio and an editorial room for the college paper. The basement under the stage will be utilized for a spacious club room.

In the angle formed by the stage extension and the north wall of the main building, there will be an addition which breaks the long lines of the building and in which will be found the coach's office. A club room will occupy a similar spot in the southwest corner.

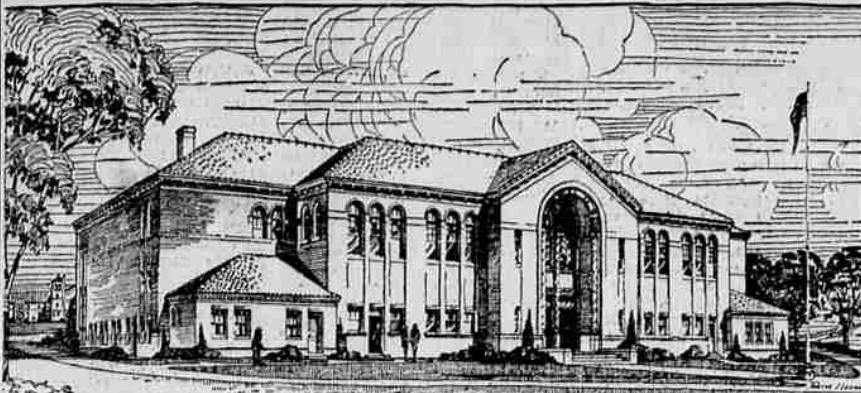
Love Will Preach
