Albany and county news in brief

Albany—The second session of the night school in irrigation will meet at 7:30 o'clock Monday night in the Conner school building. It was announced by J. V. Smith, Smith-Hughes instructor at Albany high school. Moisture requirements of crops will be the topic for the evening. Last Monday evening 23 interested farmers attended the meetings despite flood conditions from the recent rains, causing rivers of the county to overflow their banks.

Albany—Linn county spent \$19,410.25 in construction of 50 new bridges within the county and contributed \$8,343.34 toward construction of two more that were built by Linn county in conjunction with Marion and Benton counties, according to County Commissioner Warren and Remington. The greatest single expenditure for bridge work consisted of Linn county's contribution of \$8,788.14 to Marion county as its share of account for cost of the Mill City bridge, for which Linn county is obligated for half of the total cost, \$15,536.64, inasmuch as the bridge crosses the county lines. In addition to this contribution Linn county also shared in construction cost of the Stallbush bridge on Stallbush island, between Linn and Benton counties, to the extent of \$1,575.30 which was half the total cost. Furthermore the county spent \$3,570.68 repaving, painting and re-rolling 62 old bridges bringing the total amount used for bridge purposes to \$31,333.27.

Albany—Pacific university took both top places in the extemporaneous speaking contests held at the Albany college chapel Thursday night. Six colleges were represented at the contest in which James Yenman, in the men's divisions, and Joy Smith, in the women's division, captured first places for Pacific. Second place went to Randall Kester of Willamette university. Kester's speech on "The Blue Eagle or the American Eagle" won him \$7.50.
