THIRTY TALKERS ARE GIVEN PLACE IN LONG DEBATES

Dallas — The hearing on the proposed People's Utility district, held in the circuit court room Saturday afternoon, attracted a crowd which fairly jammed the meeting place. There were some 30-odd speakers taking the floor at various times to present their views on the matter. The session extended from 2 o'clock until 7 and was broken up only by a brief five minute recess.

The meeting was called to order by George W. Joseph, Jr., of Portland, vice chairman of the hydro-electric commission, who presided in place of A. J. Derby, commission chairman who was unable to be present. Joseph briefly explained the purpose of the hearing and then called on Lou Stanley, commission engineer, to outline the boundaries of the proposed district. Following this the proponents, headed by R. W. Hogg as spokesman, took the floor to present their views.

The first speaker called upon was G. W. Thies, Milwaukee. He stated that the main idea of the sponsors was to establish a bargaining agency for the people and that while many of the voters might be opposed to it, they would quickly change their ideas if they studied the situation.

R. W. Hogg spoke next and read a copy of a resolution which had been approved by those in attendance at the two-day agricultural conference held here Thursday and Friday of last week. The resolution approved the formation of the district and a copy was turned over to the commission for their files. Hogg took the editor of the Capital Journal to task for his editorial "Tax Dollars and Sense," and averred that the paper was five years behind time in its attitude. He stated that two-thirds of all Swedish farms are electrified with power from state plants which was purchased at a low cost on a cooperative basis.

Thomas H. Gentile of Monmouth presented some facts and figures compiled during an electrical survey of this city. He likened corporations to a menace and concluded his talk with the citing of a resolution drawn by the Monmouth city council in favor of the district.

J. J. Sechrist of Balston, representing the Farmers' Union, read a copy of a resolution drawn by that organization at its recent county convention. He stated that, in his opinion, it was not a matter of production which allied the country but improper distribution. He cited two successful farmers' cooperative concerns and gave that as the reason for farmers in general supporting the proposed district. Other speakers for the district were R. O. Dodson, Monmouth; Ira E. Ray, Afton; W. P. Dennis, Dallas; Glenn Adams, Bruah College; W. J. Stockholm, Monmouth; Percy Wells, Buena Vista; T. J. Primus, Independence; Lloyd Kaup, Monmouth; O. G. Wells, Independence; J. H. Henry, Bridgeport; G. Selander, Dallas; R. Z. and P. O. Powell, Monmouth.

L. B. Smith of Portland, tax specialist, opened for the opposition and urged the voters to be careful in the matter. No facts had been presented to inspire the taxpayer to support the district. He compared the per capita indebtedness of Polk county with that of the state at large and held up the Scappoose drainage district, the Port of Astoria and the city of Newport as horrible examples of defaulted bond issues. Dr. A. B. Starbuck, representing the Dallas chamber of commerce regarded the movement as premature and served notice that the chamber was opposed to it.

Mayor Lief S. Finseth, representing the city of Dallas, officially protested the creation of the district and voiced the belief that the first step in regard to power from Bonneville should come from the federal government.

Paul Wallace said that he was not in favor of giving anyone the right to place a mortgage on his property and was decidedly against the proposition. R. L. Chapman, taking the floor, said that he was not prepared to assume any more indebtedness, and C. F. Gillette, Monmouth city attorney, opposed the proposal on grounds that it gave autocratic power to five men, that he never knew of anyone to get anything for nothing and concluded by saying that he knew nothing of the resolution referred to by the proponent speaker, Thomas Gentile. Other opposition speakers were Ira Powell, R. L. Hubbs, B. F. Swope, Independence city attorney, Peter Kurte of Independence, C. L. Starr of Portland and Dallas, and U. S. Grant, Dallas.

For the rebuttal R. W. Hogg introduced Senator Peter Zimmerman. The speaker gave figures on power and light rates in Tacoma, Wash., Eugene, Ore., and Ontario, Canada, and claimed that delay in organizing the district was simply playing

RELIEF PEOPLE HUNGRY

Albany — Relief efforts in Linn county consumed 18,120 pounds of meat distributed to them through the agency of the Linn County Relief committee during 1935. It was reported by the executive secretary for the committee. The office records show furthermore that direct relief recipients received 13,200 pounds of flour, 19,600 cans of fruits and vegetables and many other articles of food during the year. The commodities were furnished for the most part by the federal government, representing in some cases government purchase of foods and textiles.

PROWLER DISTURBS BOARD

Albany — An "unexpected symphony" or antiphony developed in the basement of the home of Mrs. Ora Wallace Friday night when a group of members of the board of directors were holding a meeting upstairs. From the basement came a discordant noise which sounded as though "tin pan alley" had moved in. Investigation by police revealed that someone, presumably a prowler, had entered the basement and in the darkness had spilled from a shelf its contents of cans, empty flower pots and miscellaneous articles. The marauder was frightened away, however, before the police arrived.

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AG CONFERENCE HEARS REPORTS ON SECOND DAY

Dallas — The second day of the county agricultural conference was devoted for the most part to the submission of the reports of the various committees. The morning session also included an address by Paul Carpenter, marketing specialist of the state college extension service, on Land Utilization. The speaker said that it was apparent that future generations will be saddled with a heavy burden of taxation incurred by the present generation. Because of this factor it was essential that they should be educated to prevent recurrences of any mistakes which might have occurred during the present era.

The dairy committee, J. J. Sechrist, chairman, and Roger Morse, extension dairyman, reported that dairymen had increased steadily during the past 25 years. There is still room for expansion and quality dairy products should be stressed with a wider use of home products.

The horticulture committee, Glen Hogg, chairman, O. T. McWhorter, extension horticulturist, secretary, reported that markets appear to be saturated in this direction insofar as the purchasing power of the people is concerned. It is their opinion that the cherry and nut tariffs are highly beneficial and are the sole protection of the growers. Their continuance is urged. They stress that all products should be selected for quality under an Oregon trade name.

The soil committee, C. W. Brandstetter, chairman, Arthur King, extension specialist in soils, secretary, reported in their findings that land was one of the greatest sources of value and return. They suggest conservation with particular attention towards greater fertility.

Poultry, Morris Christenson, chairman, H. E. Cosby, extension poultryman, secretary, emphasized quality as a primary issue. This is necessary in view of the fact that the trade is greatly dependent upon the larger eastern cities. The value of co-operative marketing was pointed out and commended as an important agency in developing a fixed demand for Oregon poultry products.

Livestock, Jack Stump, chairman, H. A. Lindgren, Extension Animal Husbandman, was reported to be in a healthy condition. Sheep reached a new high mark with 26,000 head in the county. The committee recommends a moderate increase where feed conditions justify such a step.

The farm crops committee, R. D. Pence, chairman, E. R. Jackson, extension crops specialist, secretary, indicated that there was an opportunity for producing a variety of field and garden seeds as a business venture. Their findings show that grass, vegetable and grain seeds had proven fairly profitable to date.

The marketing committee, R. O. Dodson, chairman, Paul Carpenter, secretary bore down on the importance of standard quality due to the fact that products in many instances were being shipped to distant markets.

The conference closed with the adoption of a resolution that copies of all the reports submitted will be mailed to every farmer in the county.

Then the pads were removed and the skin examined for redness and irritation. Hundreds of such tests proved Lifebuoy far and away the mildest.
